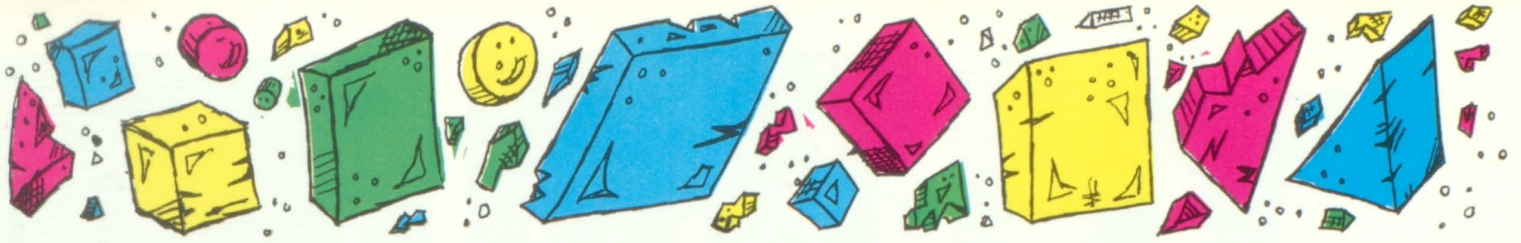

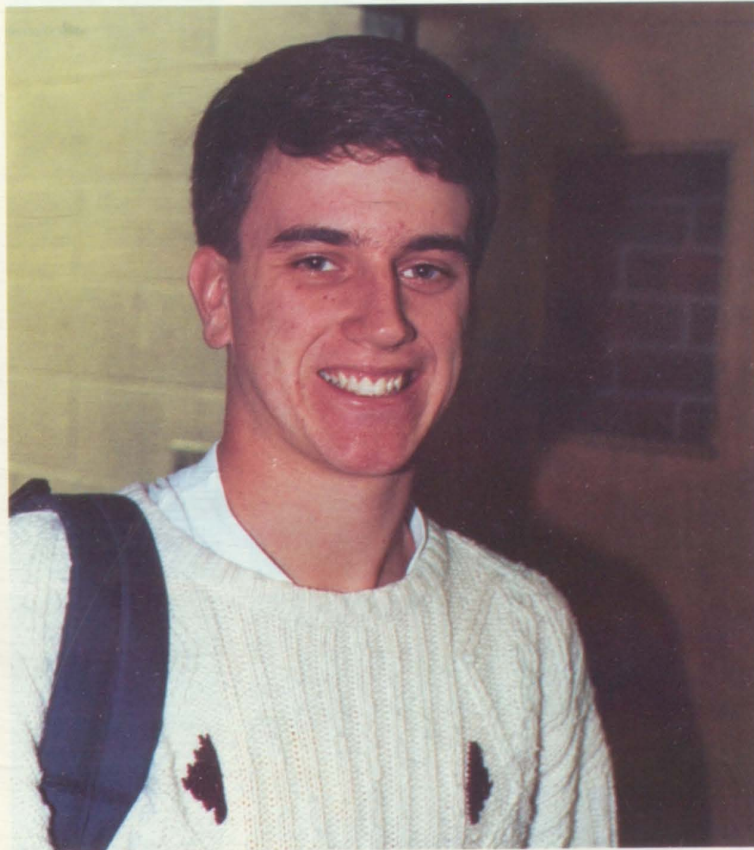

"choral music director or a drywall company owner!"

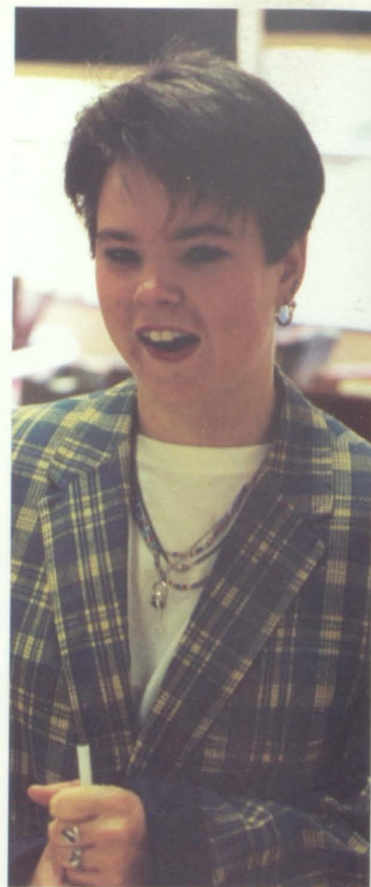

From the seniors surveyed, the most popular field of study was science and engineering with

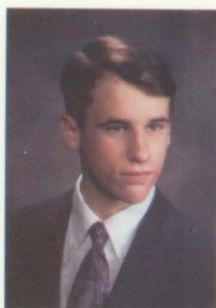
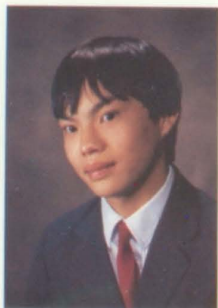

The future offers an endless number of possibilities for life — something for everyone!

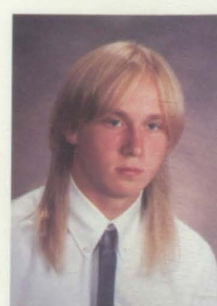
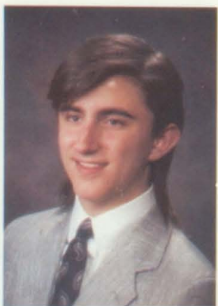

I asked Nick Pallos what his most memorable moment was on a weekend, and he said "Last year when Bill Lawton and Andy Long crushed my car door."

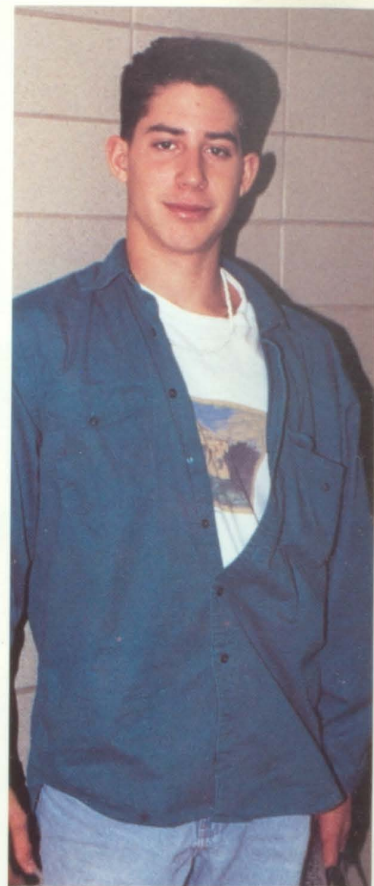
Speaking of cars, Mark Soper's 1968 Oldsmobile (nicknamed the

"Hooptie") is usually seen transporting Adam Kownacki and Tony Martin around to various hot-spots in the "Oak-Town."

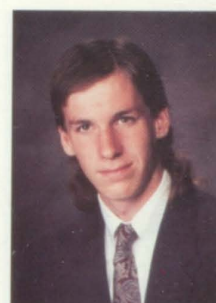
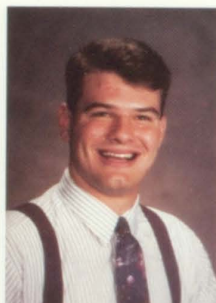

my back yard and head to Japan." Sarah Sage says she likes to go jet skiing in her bath tub.

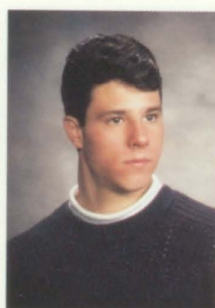

So no matter what we do on the weekend, come Monday we have to think of the busy days ahead.

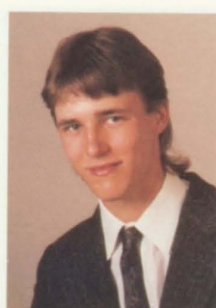


Erik Frederiksen shows us his In-House referral and wonders where the girls will be this weekend.

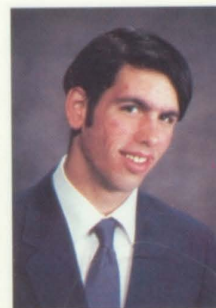

John Sawtell, a KHS Hall Stalker, says that he baffles the hall guards by "catchin' some z's" during his open hour. He is

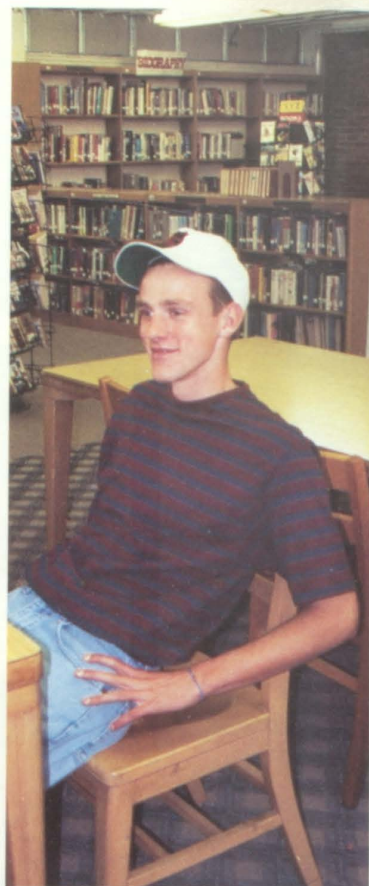
not the only perpetrator, but he is one of the few who actually stays at Kimball.

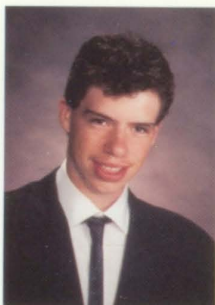
There is one flaw of being a

The officers worked together throughout many productive days. They discussed plans for the many functions they were responsible for, in order to make the functions as successful as possible. "Each of

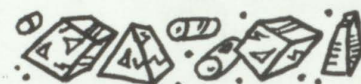
the officers were very different. Fortunately we all worked well together. We didn't always agree but our disagreements made our final decision the best," Gina Martin said.

And Aaron Hayes agreed. "I can do the same things that I did last year in homeroom during the time period after second hour."

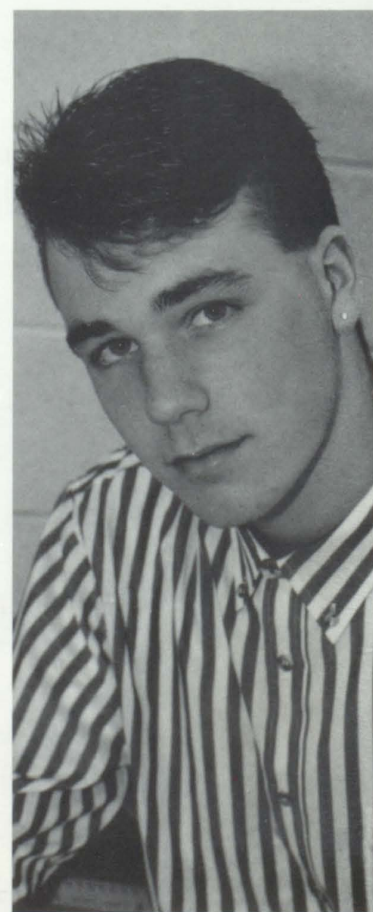
On the other side of things,

We all have big plans for our money. "I need money for the new car I'm going to buy once I get rid of the brown bomber!" stated Colleen McCormick.

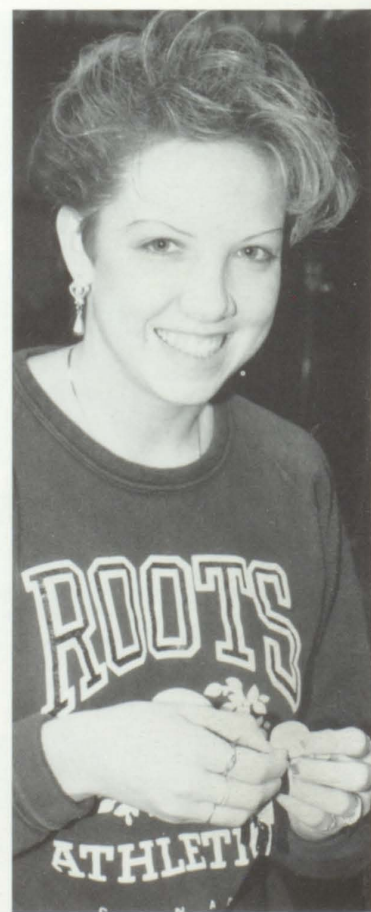
Today's juniors top priorities are

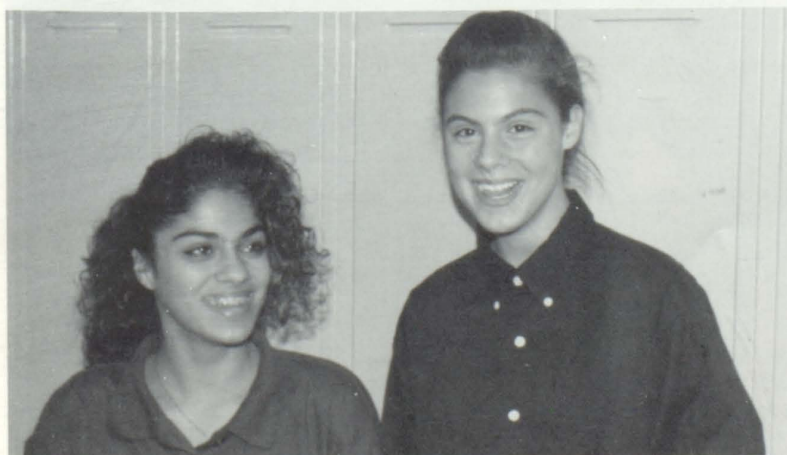
And also being able to crack open a book and study with my two older sisters." Liz Mawhinney also likes being a freshman for one reason, "More hot guys!"

"I believe the students want to be the best they can be - this must be modeled by our juniors and seniors if we are to realize our full potential," he stated.

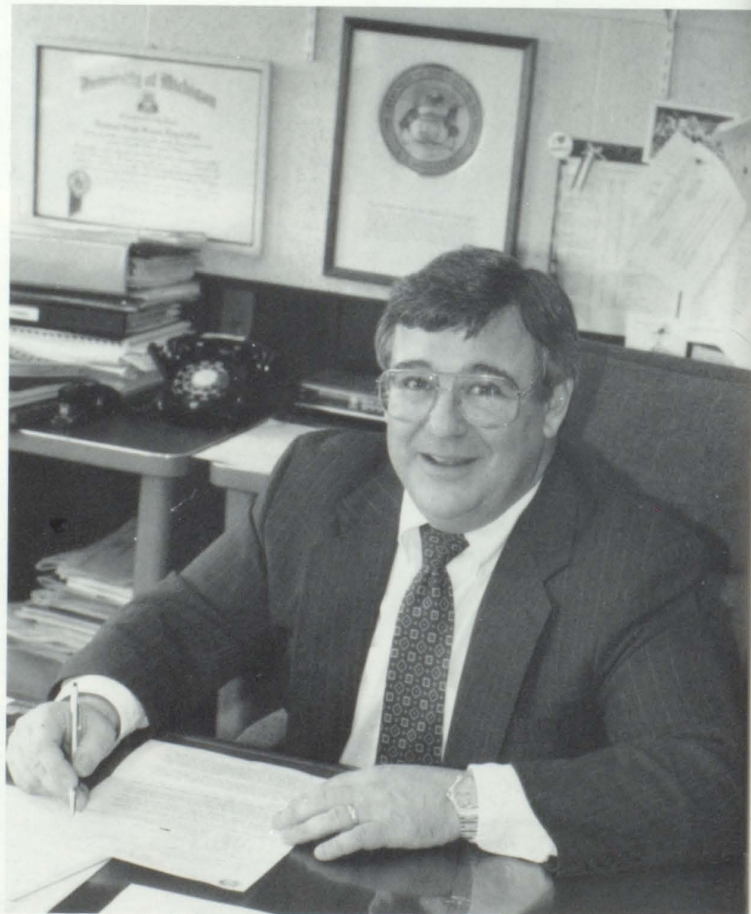

be fun and kind of easy. I learned a lot."

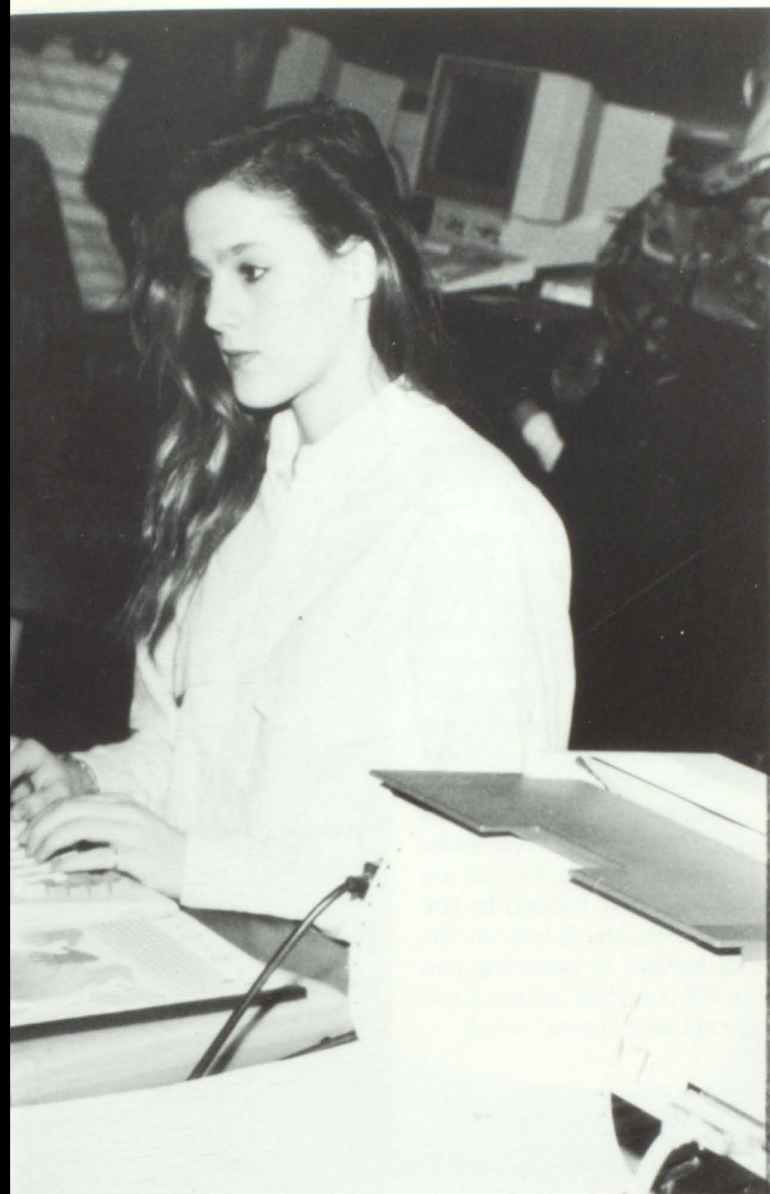

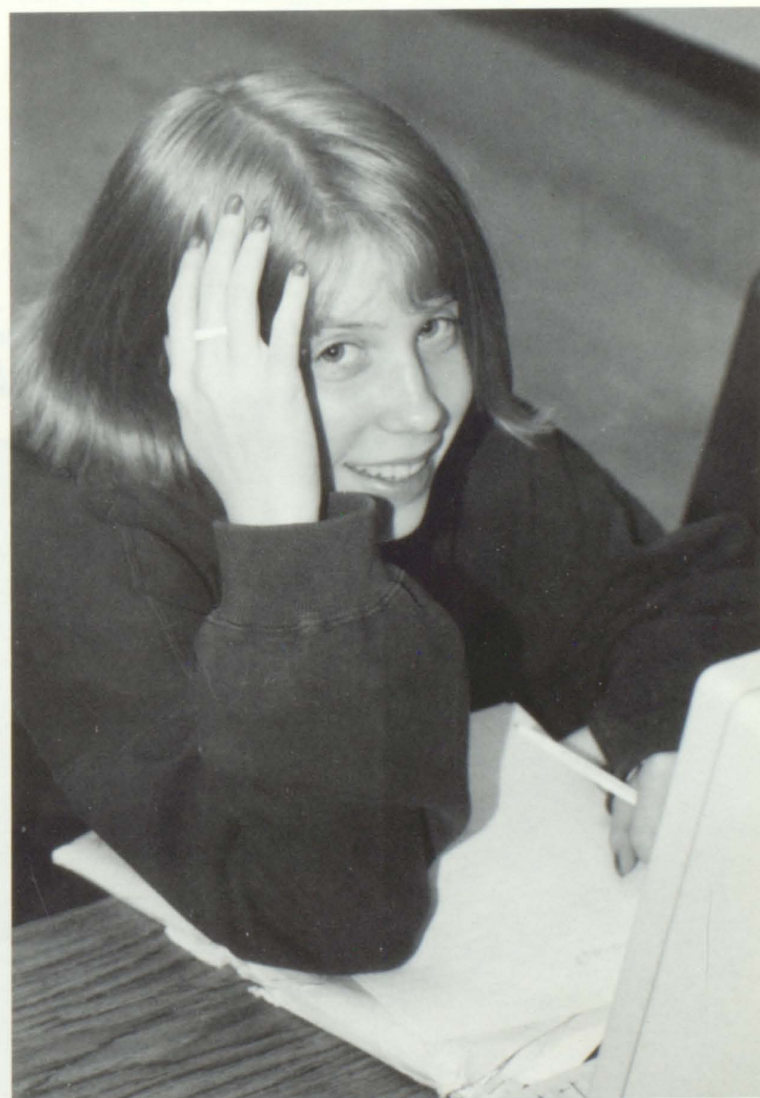

learn, and fun too!"

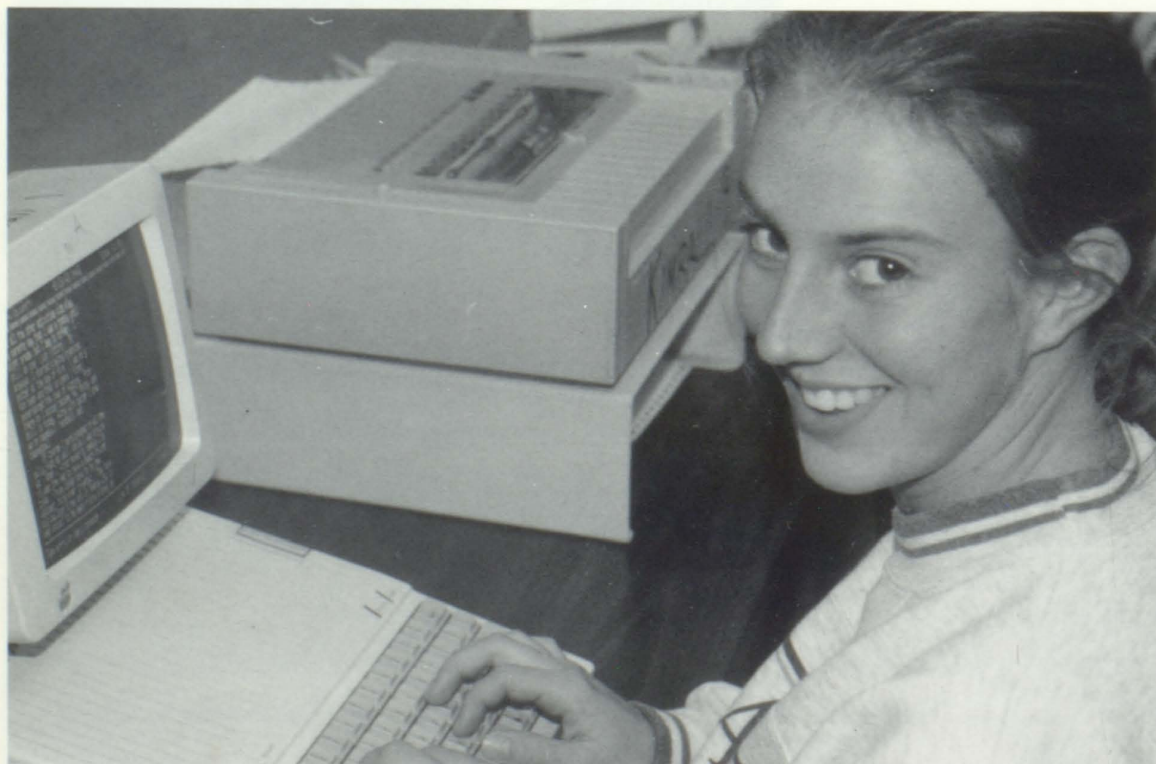

You don't have to be planning a career in computers to take a

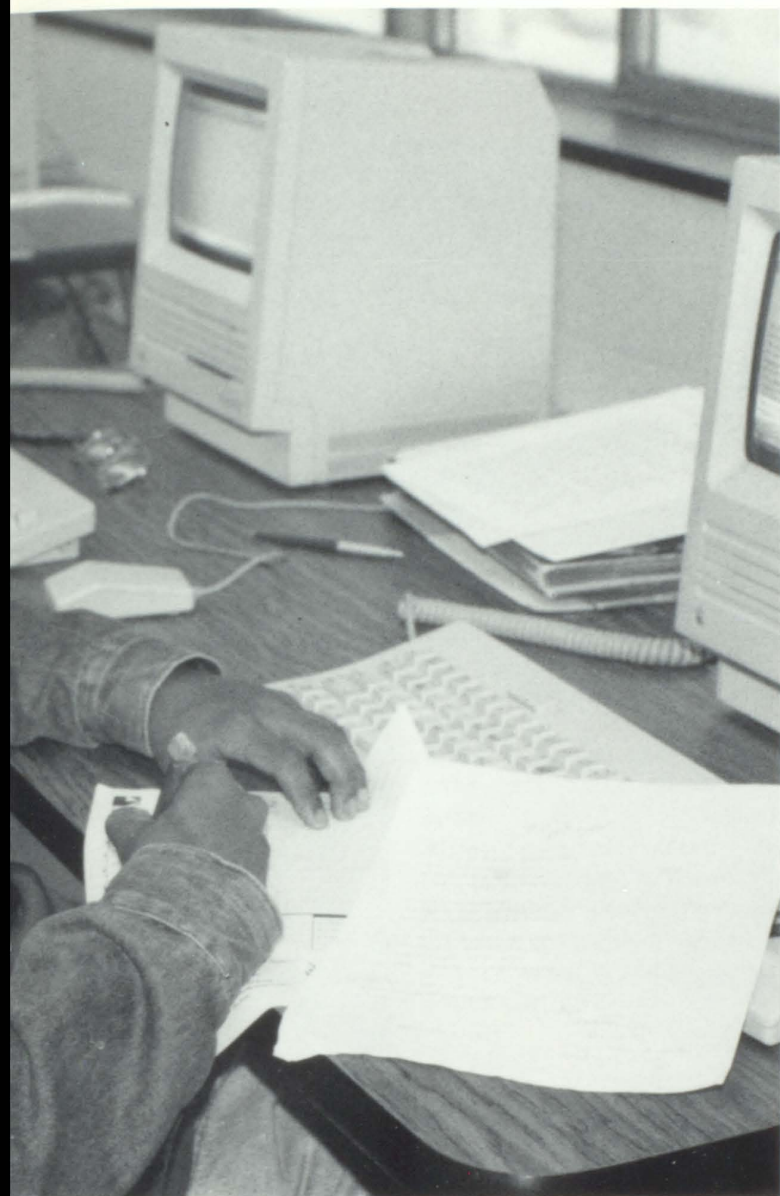

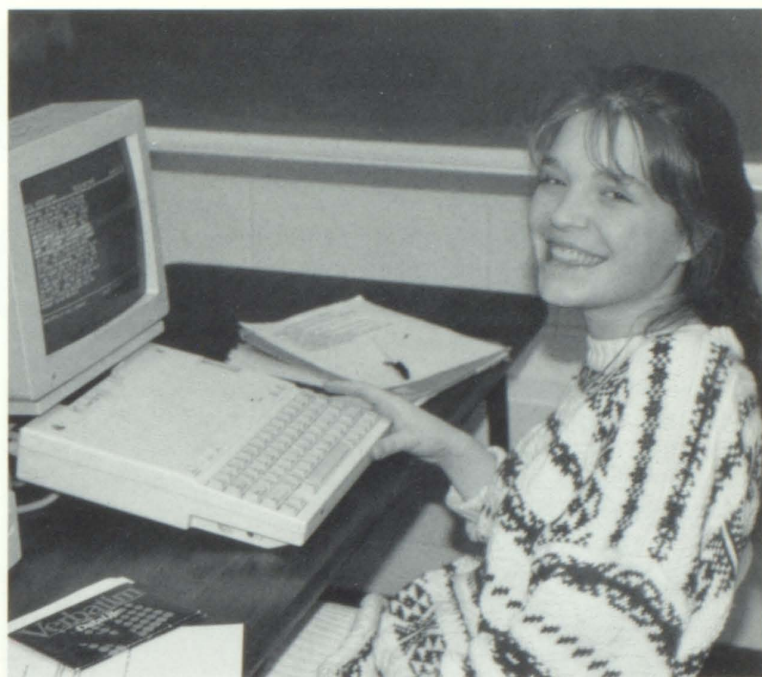

Kimball's Industrial Arts Department has a wide variety of classes for all students no matter what field they decide to go into.



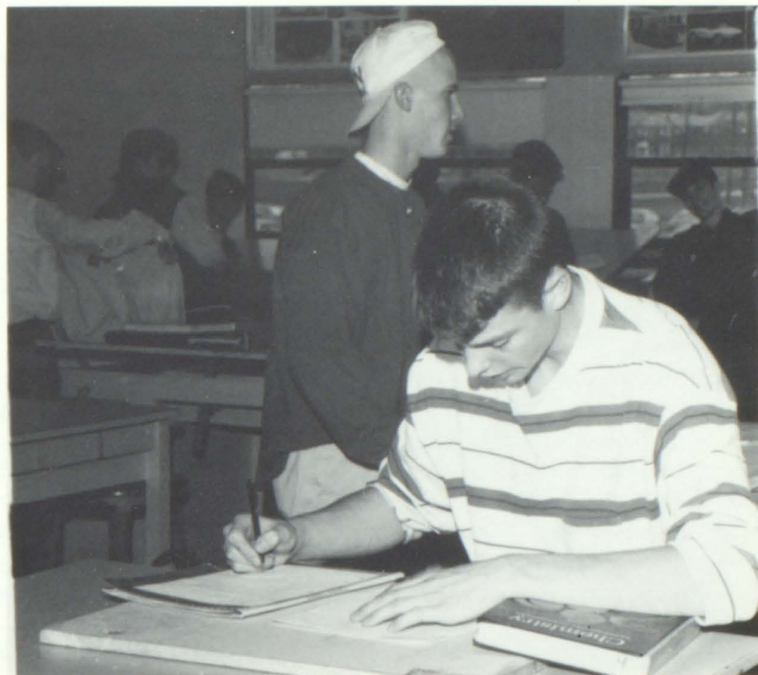

There are many memories to look back on. Bill Moore said, "I remember when I was on the range and I went to turn on the radio and I ran through a stop sign."

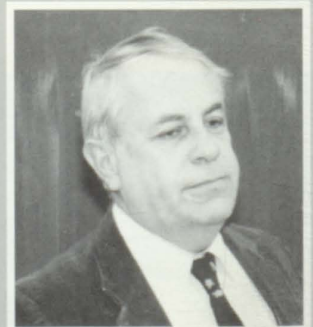
Most students say the most nerve racking thing is the 250 question test which determines whether or not they pass the course.

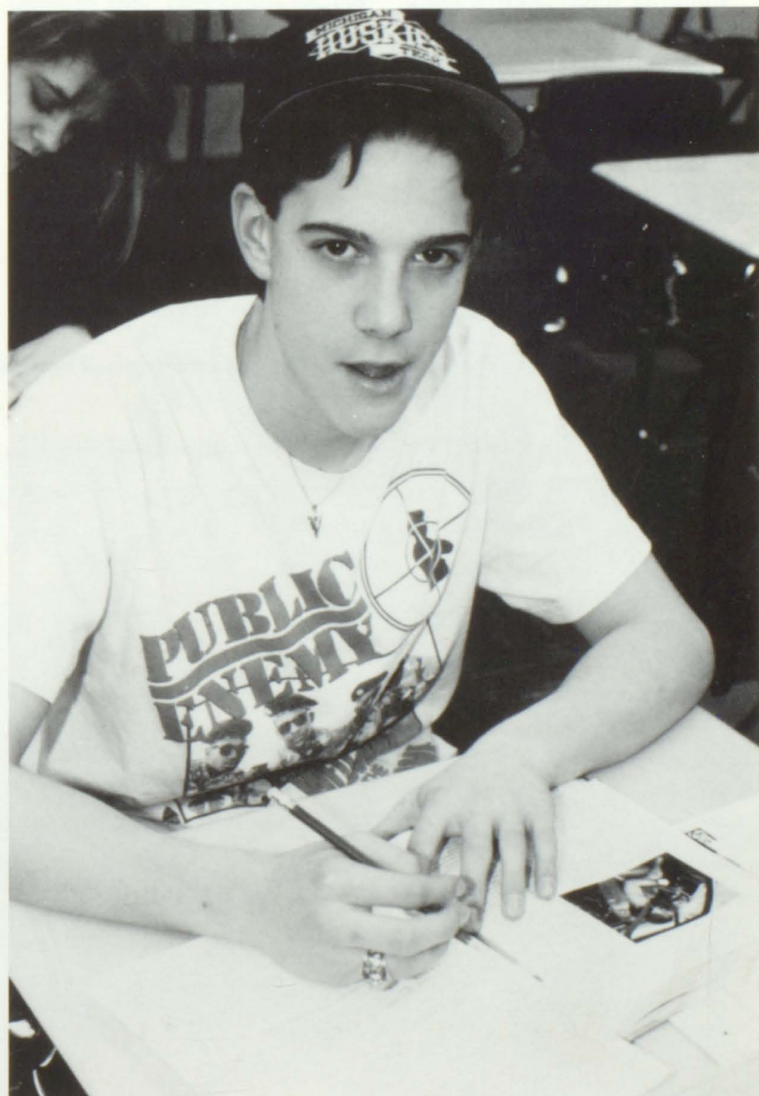

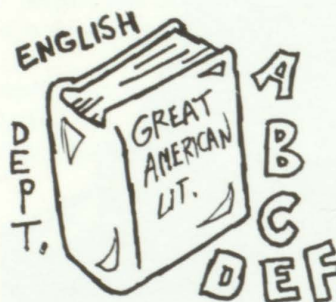
explained, "I have speech so I can fulfill my credit. The class is interesting and fun because I get to express myself."

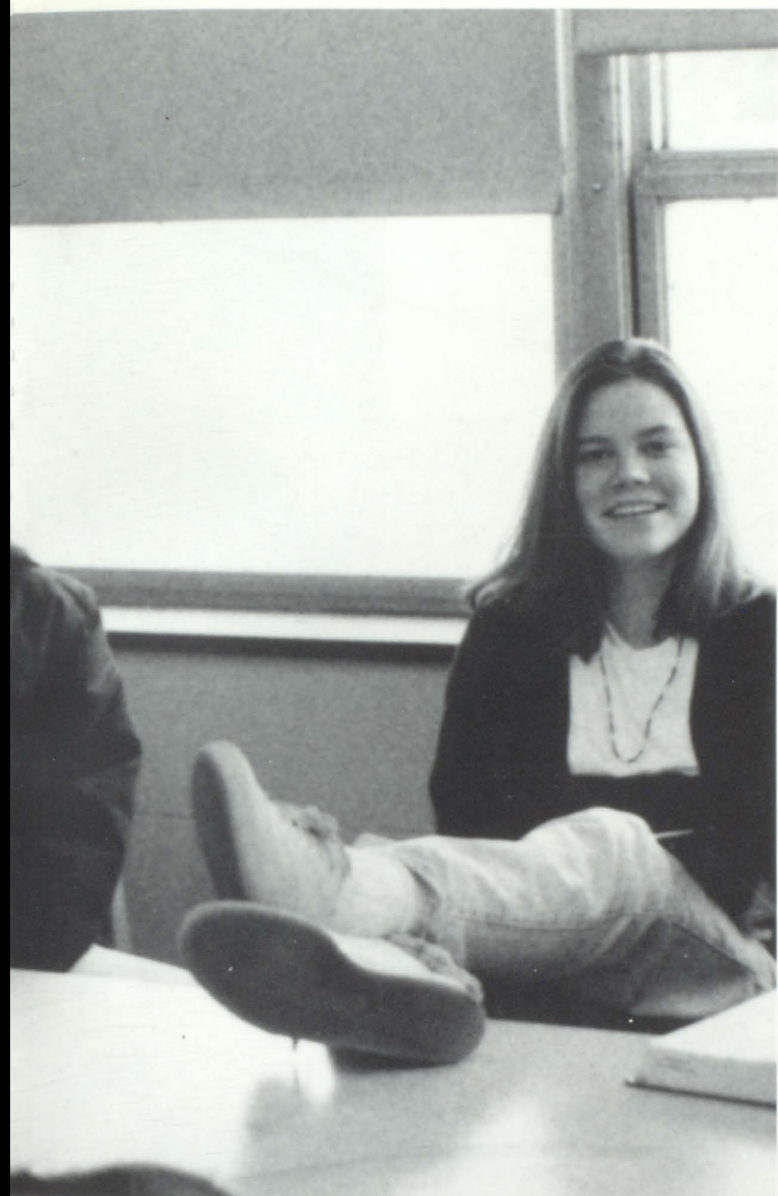
The English Department at Kimball is filled with great teachers and great minds with a lot of potential. With all of the different classes involving English you can easily find an area of interest to satisfy you.



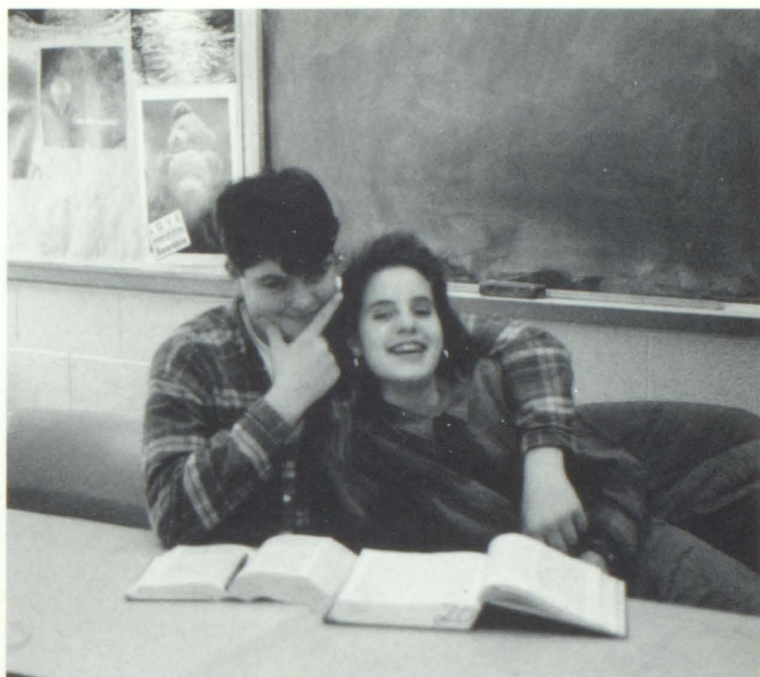

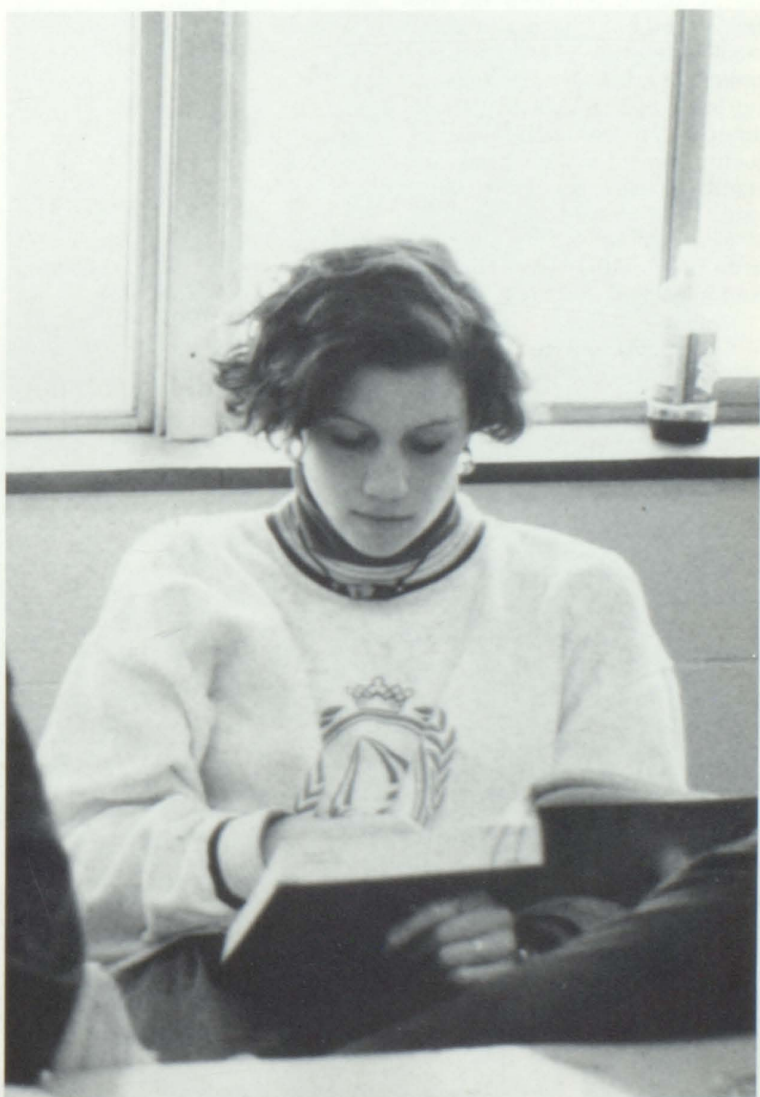

Herald on a specific date. All of this and more goes into a successful **Herald**," Amy Baldauf stated.

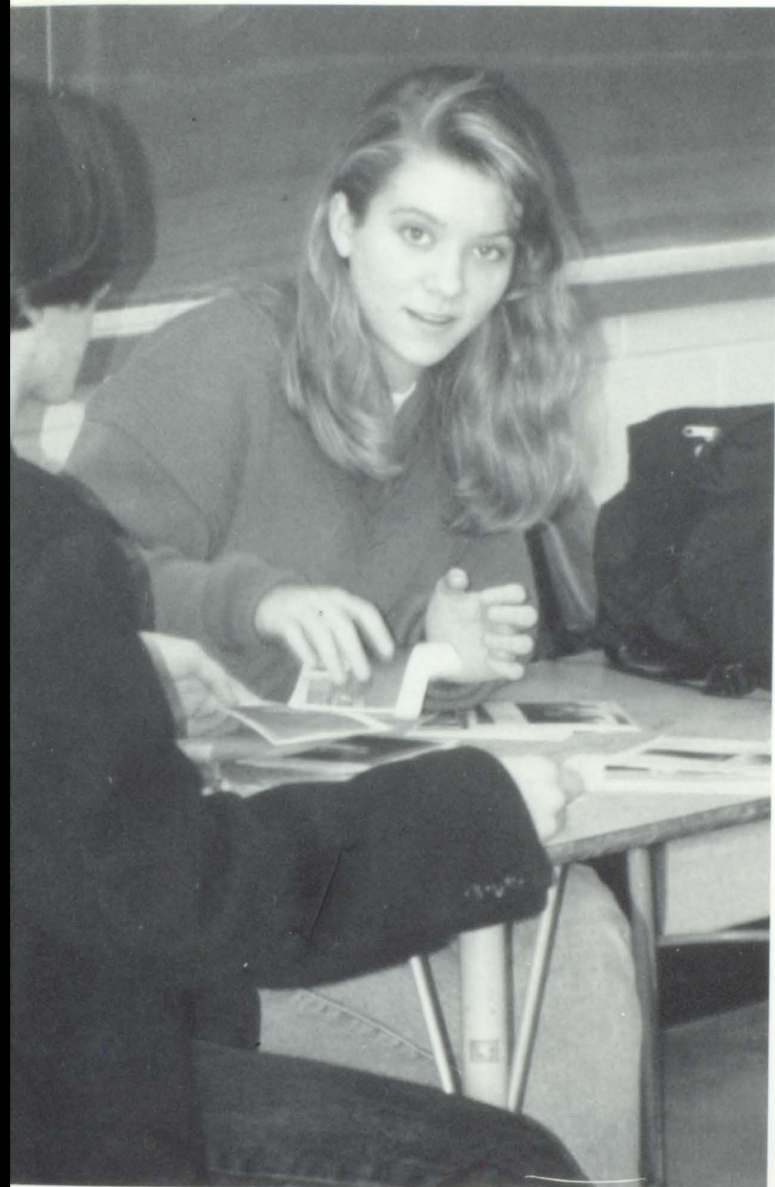

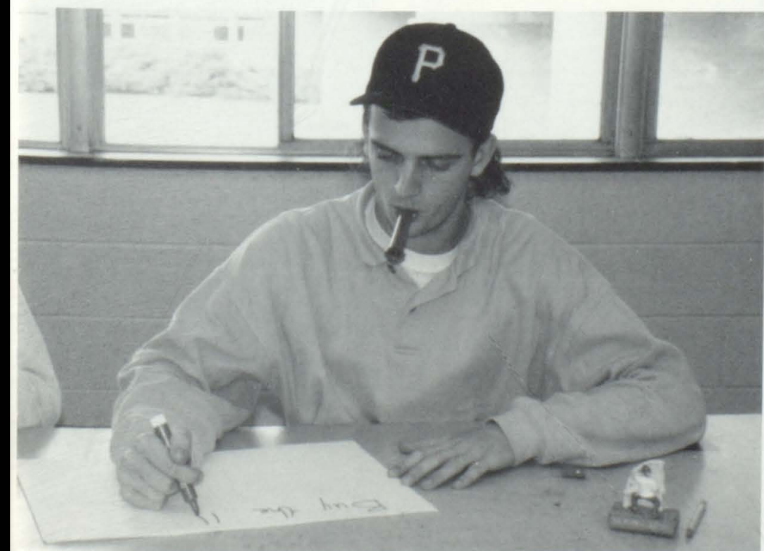

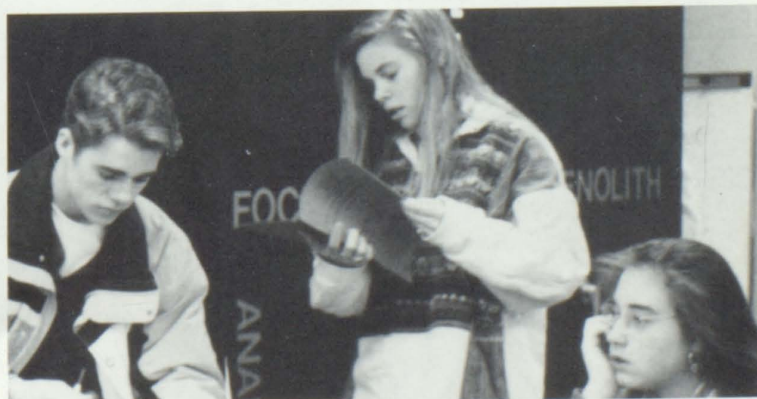

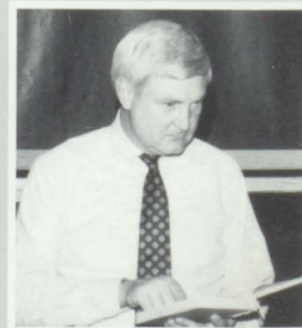

No matter what language you choose to learn here at Kimball you will be stepping on a path that will help and guide you for the rest of your life.

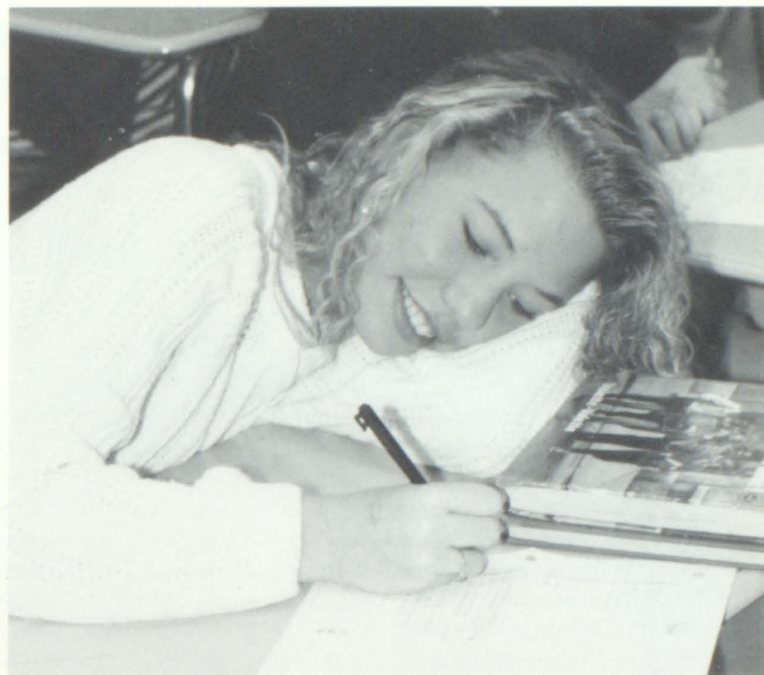

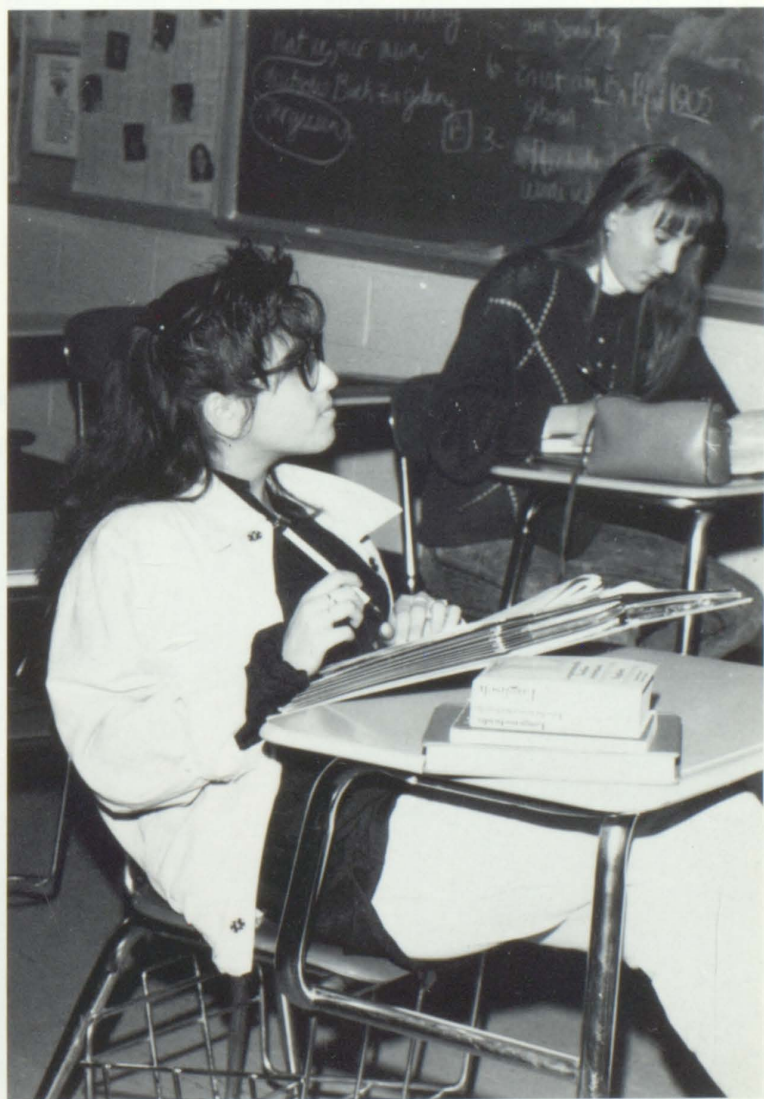

money working co-op on these jobs. AV workers help hook up amps and microphones at dances and concerts.

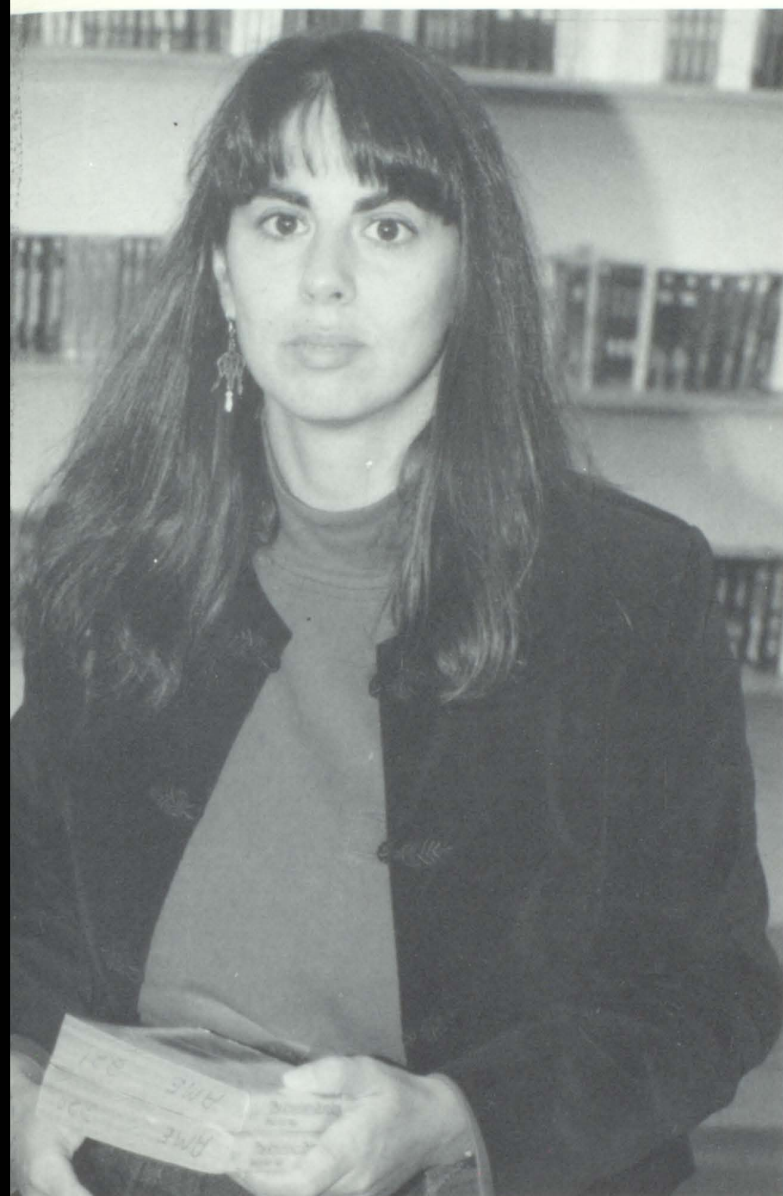

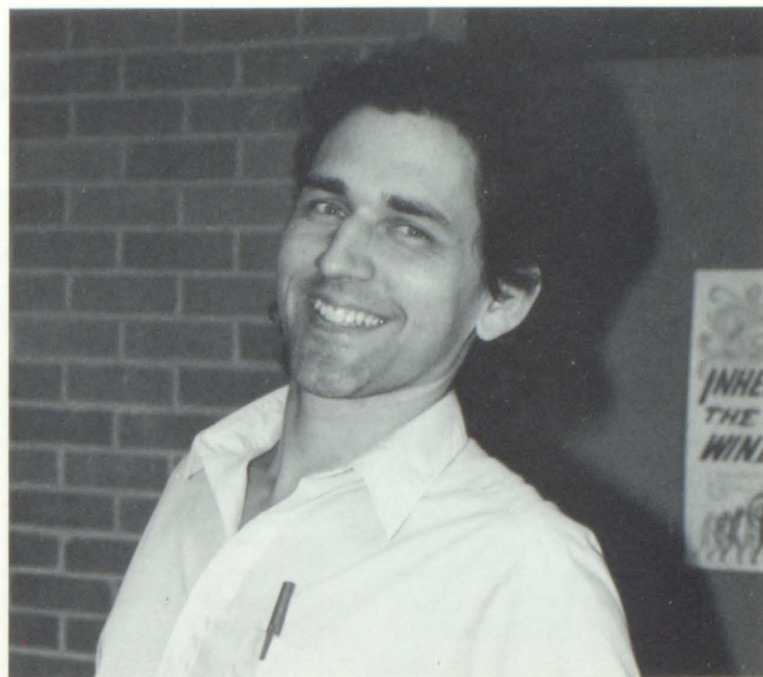

MATH NUMBERS-A ROLE AT KHS

“My objective for my students is that they all will demonstrate a clear understanding of mathematical concepts and ideas,” said Mrs. Dropiewski, a second year teacher here at Kimball. The Kimball High School Math Department which is headed by Mr. Jacobson, a 29 year teacher here, is a very good one with most of the teachers holding a bachelor of Science with a major in Mathematics. Mr. Jacobson said, “I want students to be able to deal with the quantitative aspects of their lives to the best of their capabilities.”

“I like teaching math because it prepares students for critical thinking and analysis of the environment about them. I want my students to be competent in math class, but also in real life situations,” said Mr. Ewell, who is in

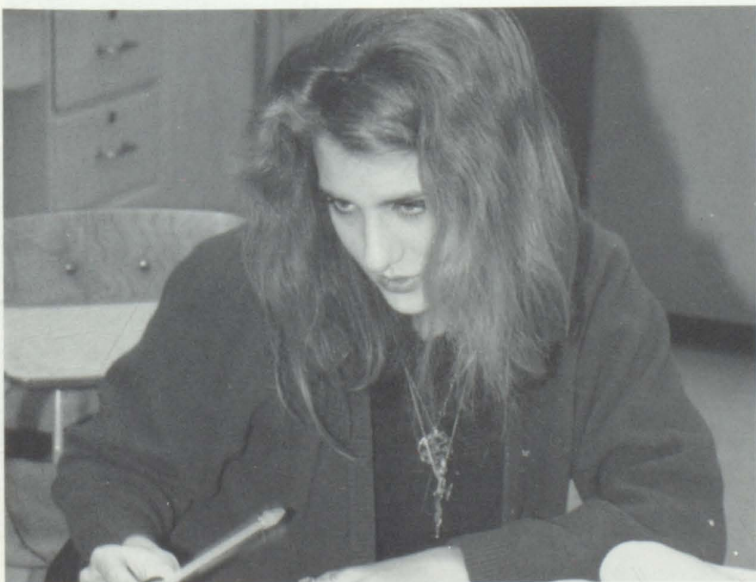

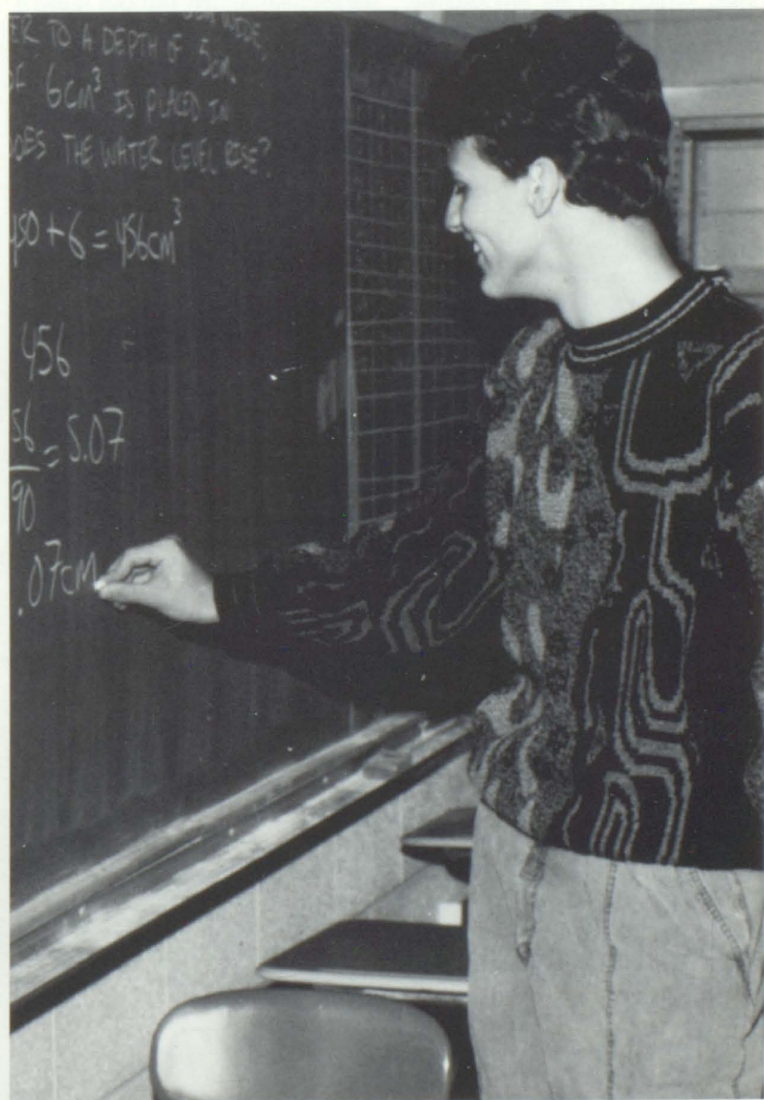

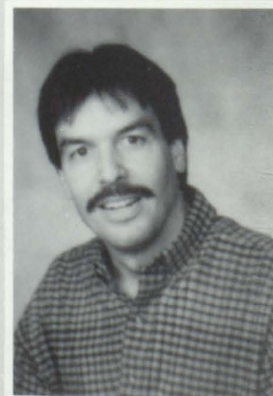

Frank Genslak, senior drummer said that Symphony Band was his favorite because, "the music is harder, the performances are more advanced, and the drums are just too heavy for marching."

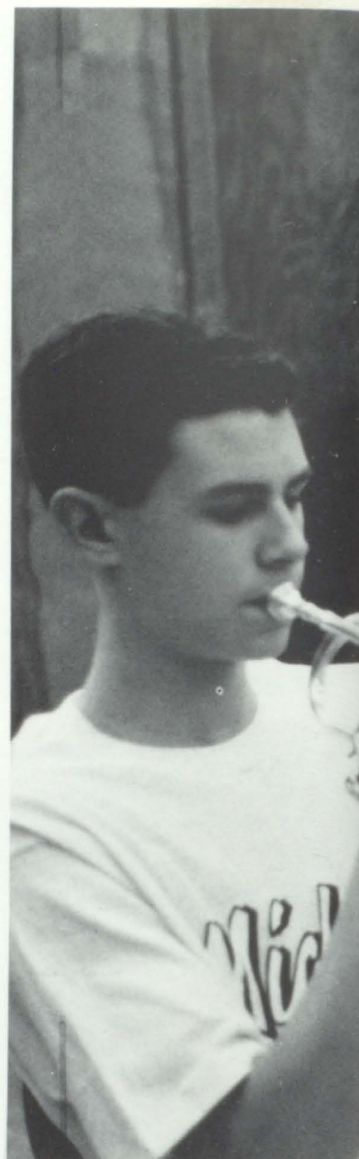
Kimball's Marching, Symphony, Concert, Jazz and Pep Bands

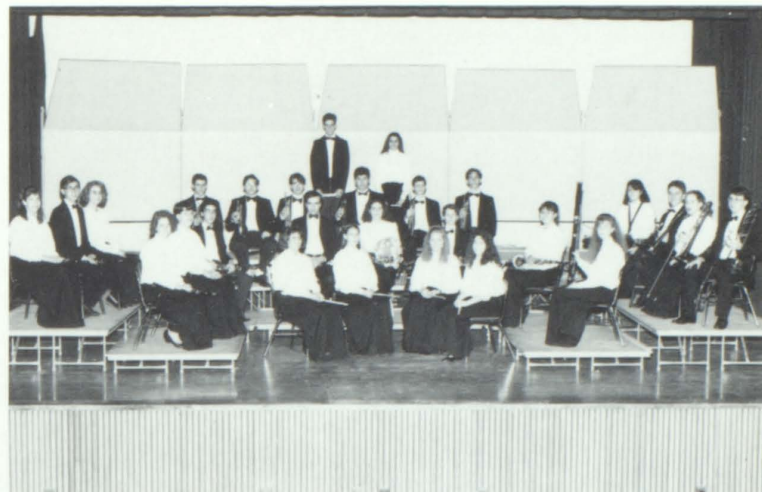

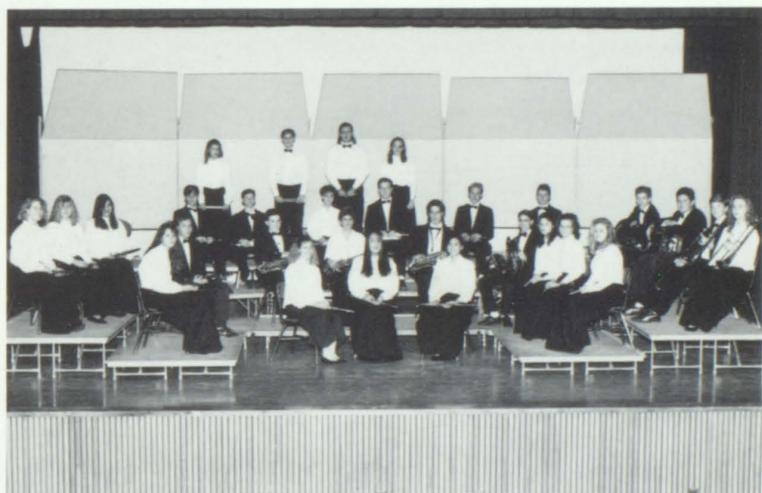

hard times."

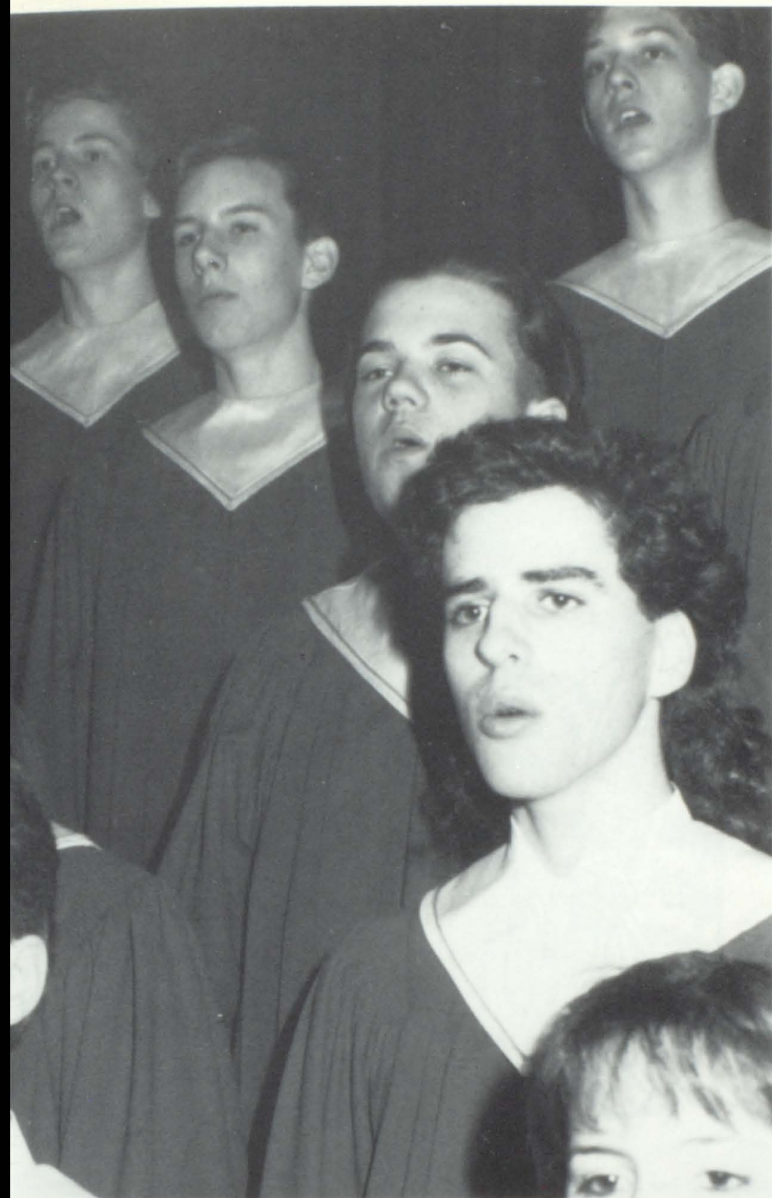

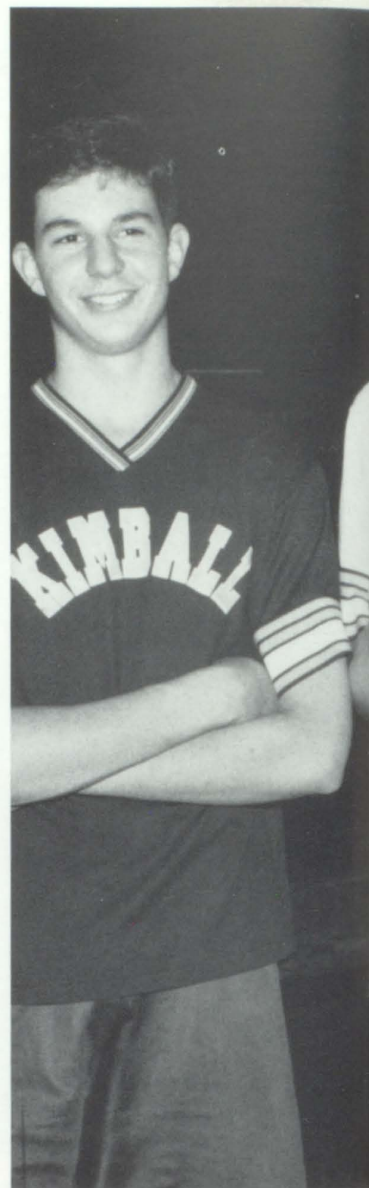

shape too!"

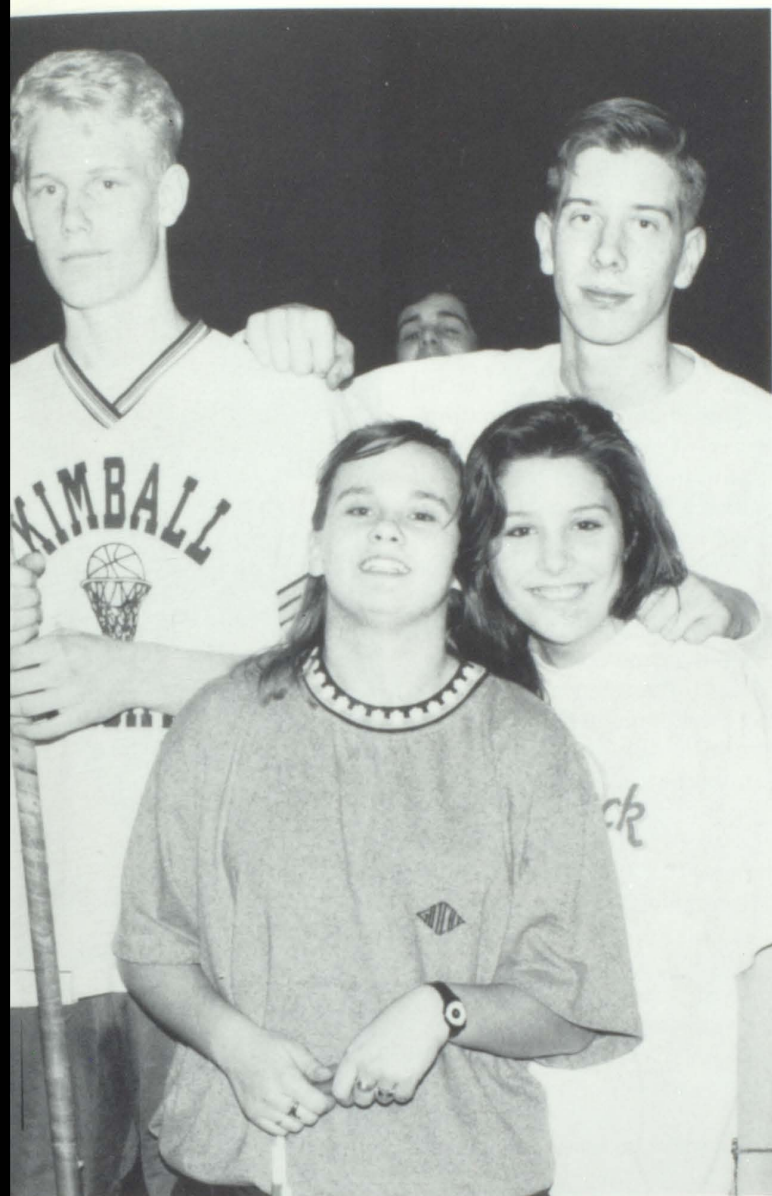

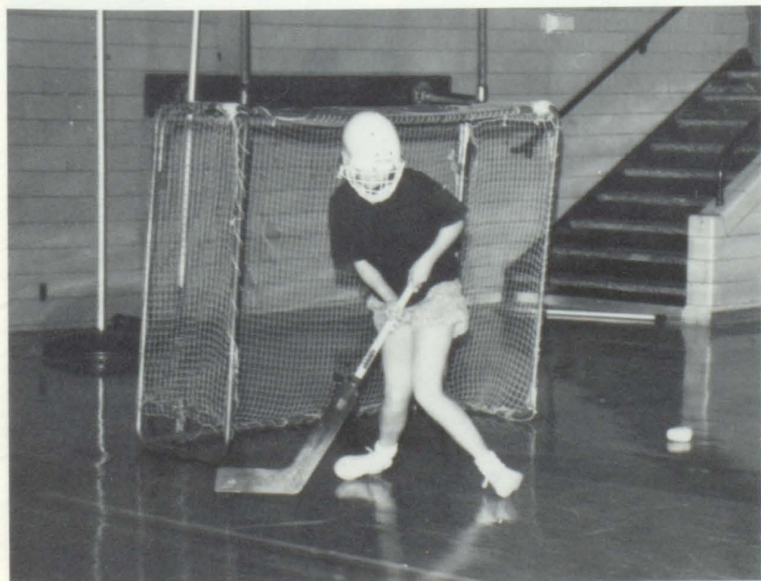

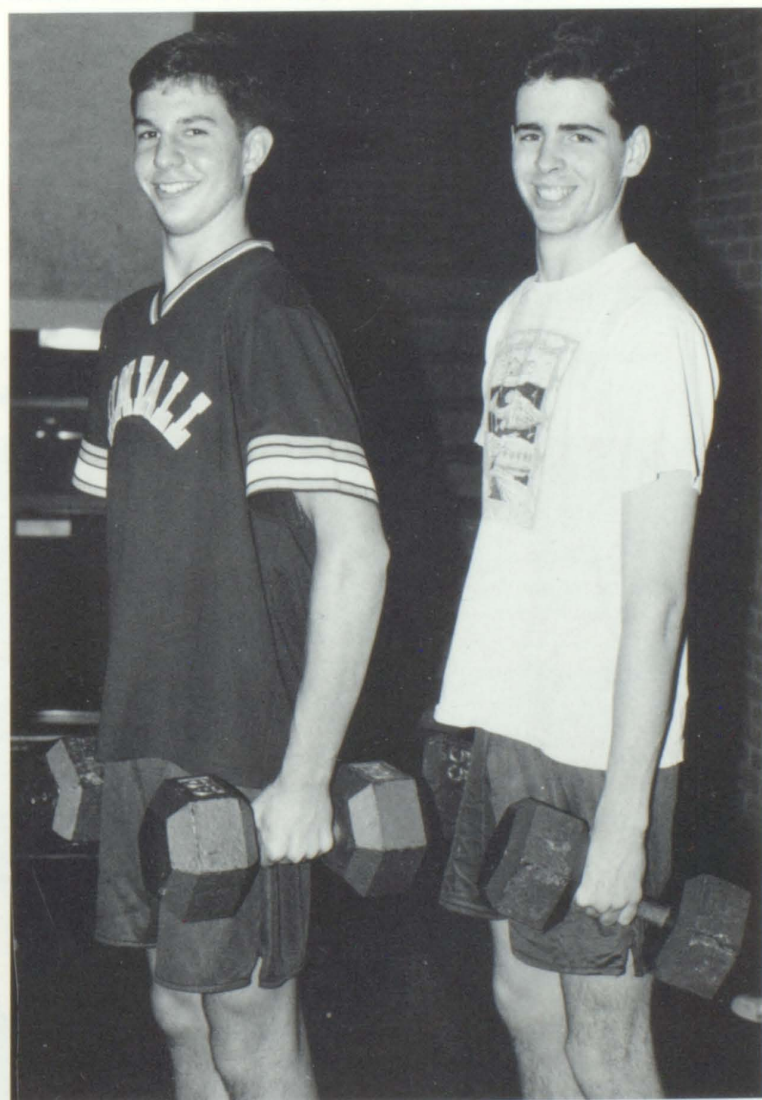

Mrs. Christensen, a teacher at Kimball for six years, suggested that some courses be added to the already outstanding list of sci-

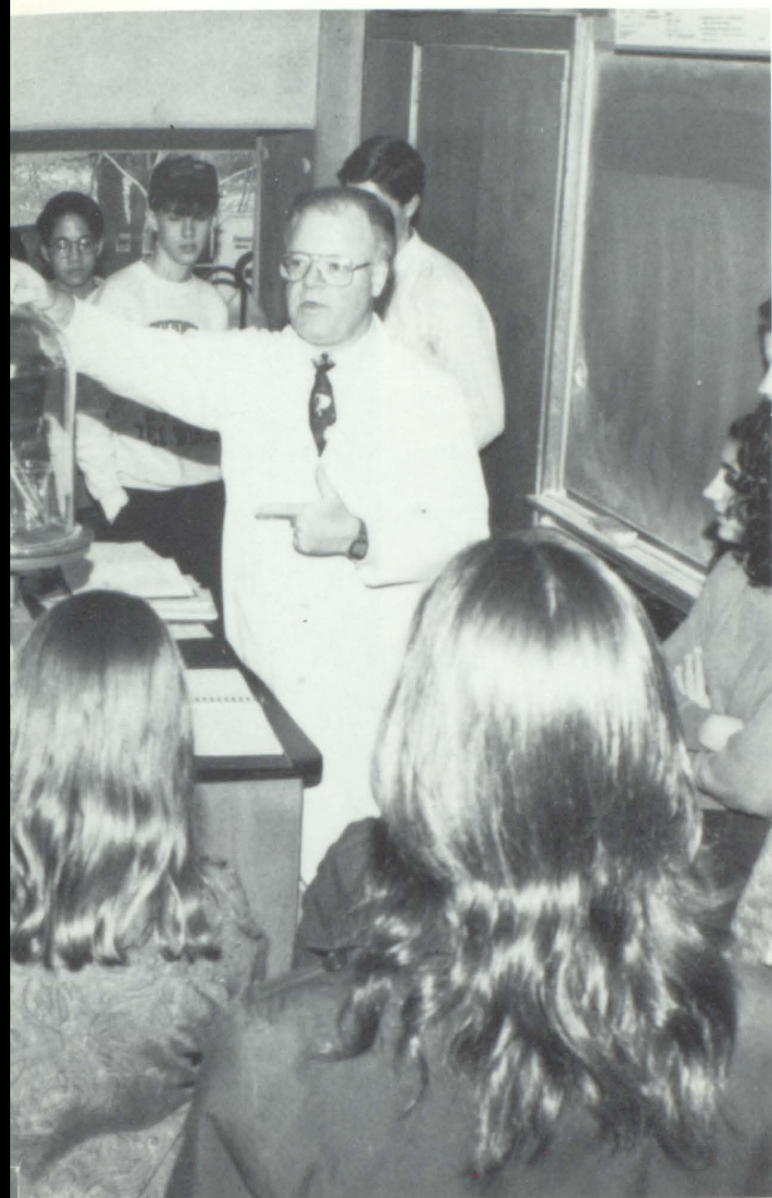
ence courses available. "I would like to see a Human Anatomy and Physiology course offered for those students thinking of entering health careers such as medicine or nursing."

Senior: Government-required

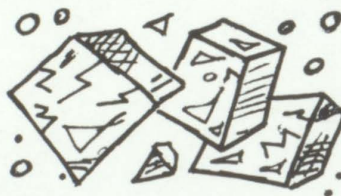
Starr Thompson said, "Mr. Grant's class is very exciting, he makes the class interesting instead of boring."

Diana Nimmoor says, "I'm in Government right now and I really find it interesting. I know it will be helpful for me in the future."

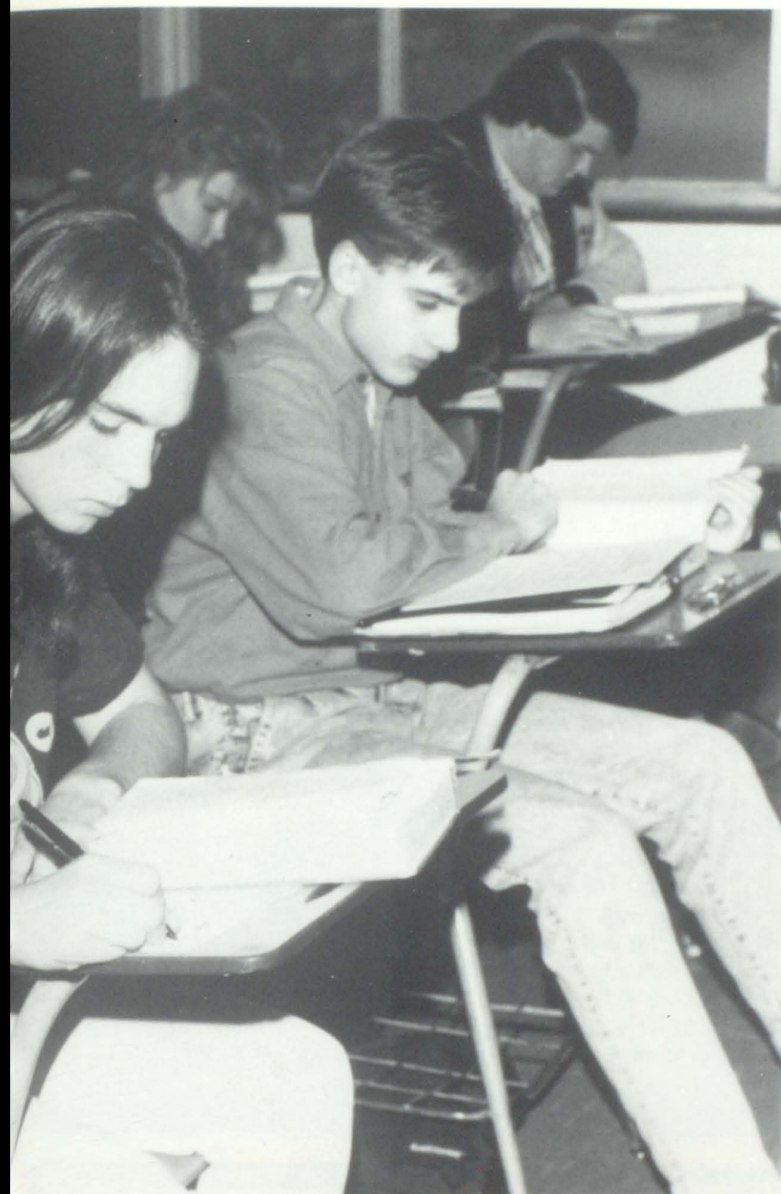

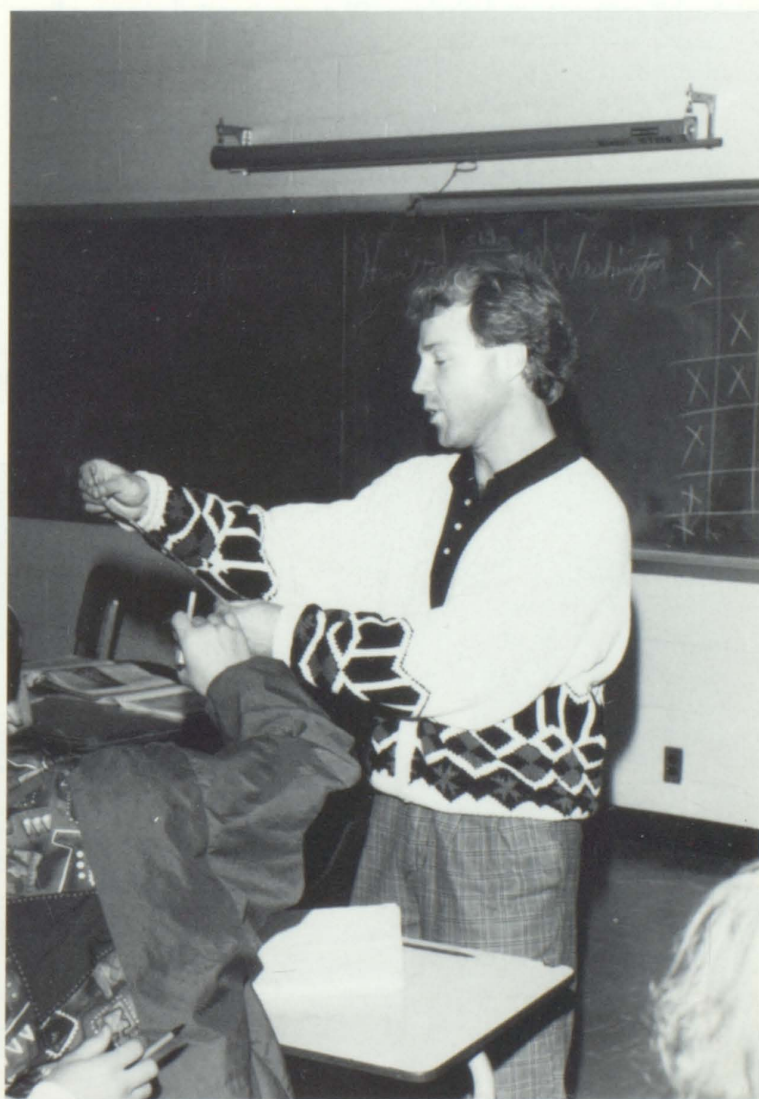

Preparing For A Productive Life

The Special Education Program that Kimball provides appropriate educational programs for students with disabilities. The teachers in the Special Education department have very challenging jobs. Not only do they educate their students, they also counsel them, organize various field trips, and help them with scheduling.

The Special Education teachers are: Theresa Austin, Patricia Banasch, Trudie Connor, Susan Jones, David Potter, Judith Samuel, Kathryn Stedman, Michael Tomlinson, and Cathie Weil. The staff also includes the physical therapist Susan Ruttenberg, the speech therapist Joan Scheel, the occupational therapist Kathleen Turner, and the hearing consultant Joyce Fangboner.

Some of the school related activities that students partake in are: learning aspects of money in order to be independent in earning money and paying bills; learning

the correct ways to shop for groceries, clothing and other everyday items; volunteering at Wing Lake Developmental Center; swimming at the YMCA; going out to lunch at area restaurants; and various other field trips to learn more about the city in which they live, and to have fun.

Another activity that students participate in are athletics. Some kids have earned Kimball Varsity Letters as a reward for athletic accomplishments, and some become involved with the Special Olympics (mentally impaired), or the Cerebral Palsy Games (physically impaired).

David Potter teaches physical education to students K-12 who have visual, physical and mental impairments. He became involved with special need students while substitute teaching. "Because of my interest in physical education, I decided to pursue a Masters Degree in Adaptive Physical Edu-

cation," he said. "The most rewarding part of my job is seeing students striving to succeed in a skill and then finally reaching their goal in a particular activity."

When asked if they could do anything to change or improve the Special Education Program at Kimball, most teachers agreed with Mr. Tomlinson when he said, "I would ask for more of what we have already—that all of the students at Kimball High School accept each other for who they are, and not look down on someone's disability or weakness. The student body at Kimball is very considerate toward Special Education students. The "regular" kids are always willing to help out those who need the extra push or time to accomplish a task."

We are a very fortunate community to have such a wonderful program in our school.

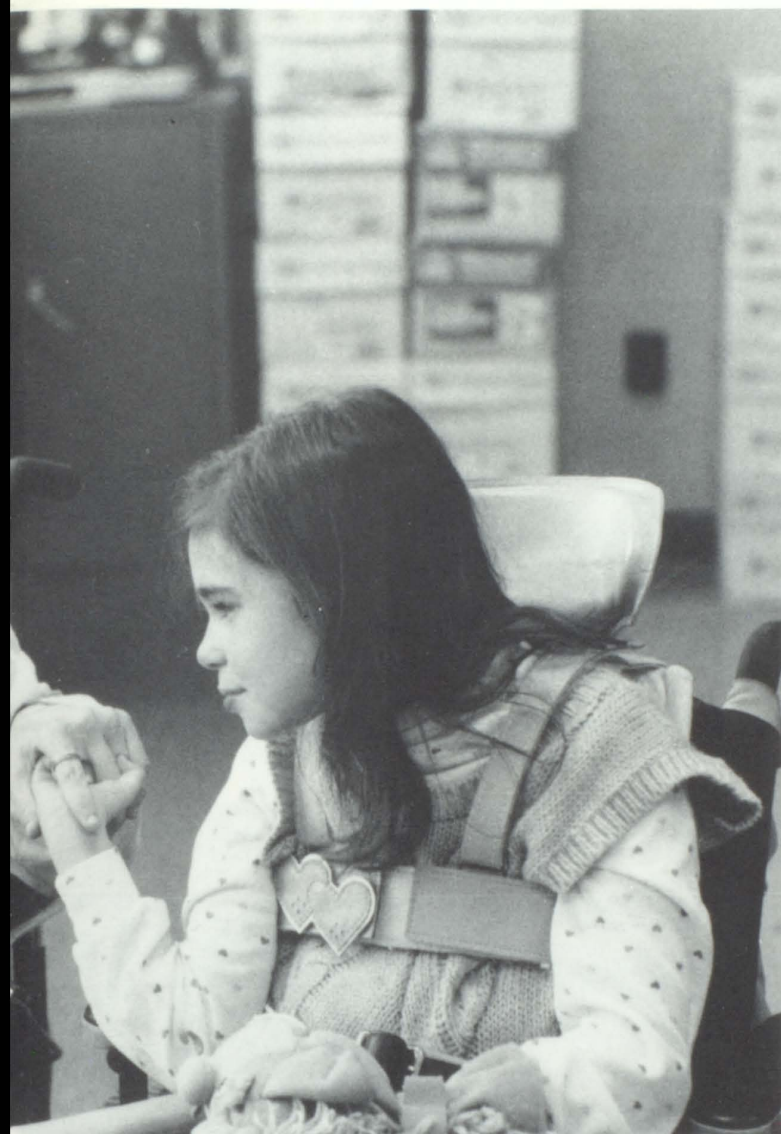

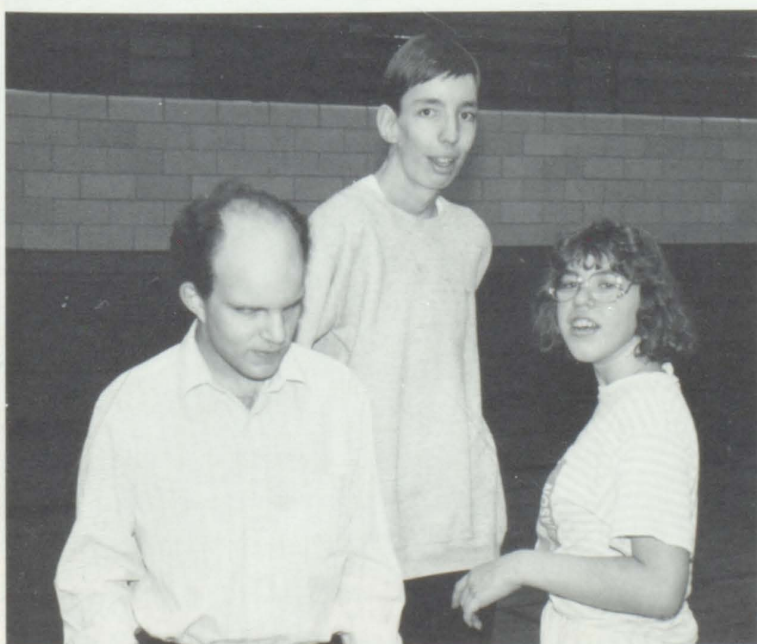
When asked what she found most rewarding about her job, Ms. Austin replied, "when students achieve a goal that they have been working toward, and realize that they have potential and attempt something new or different."



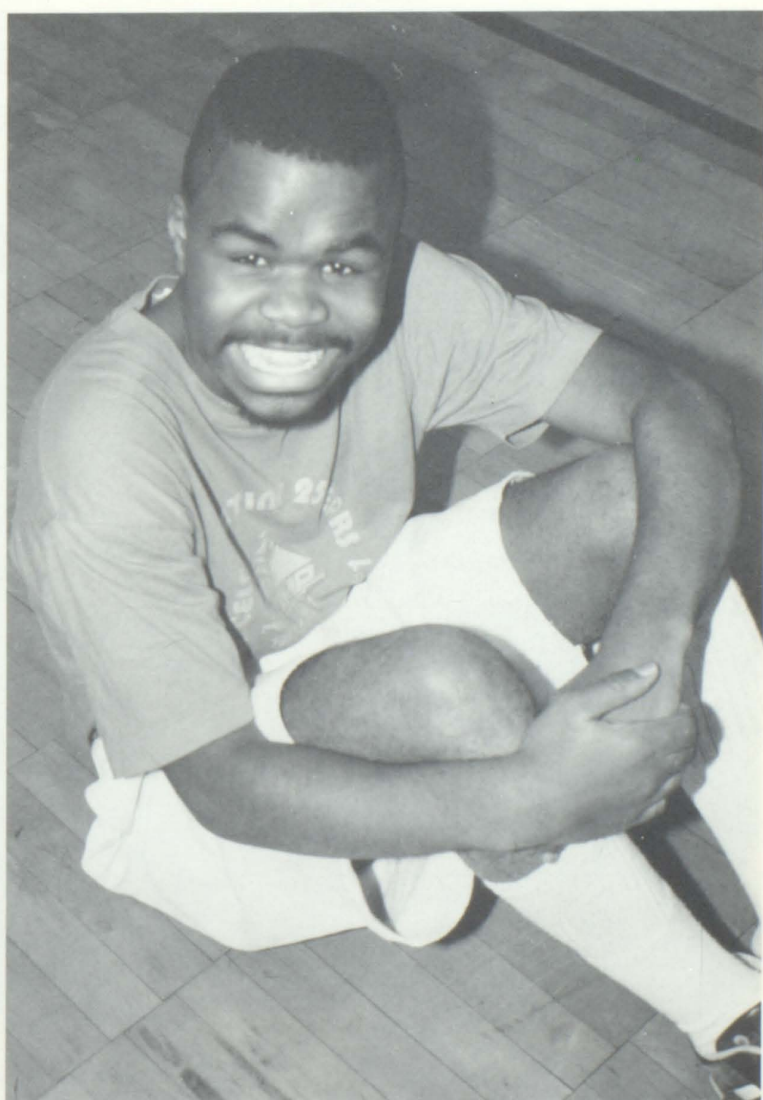

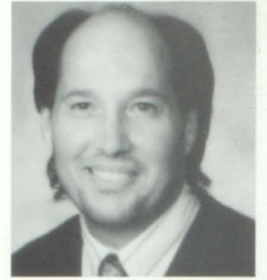

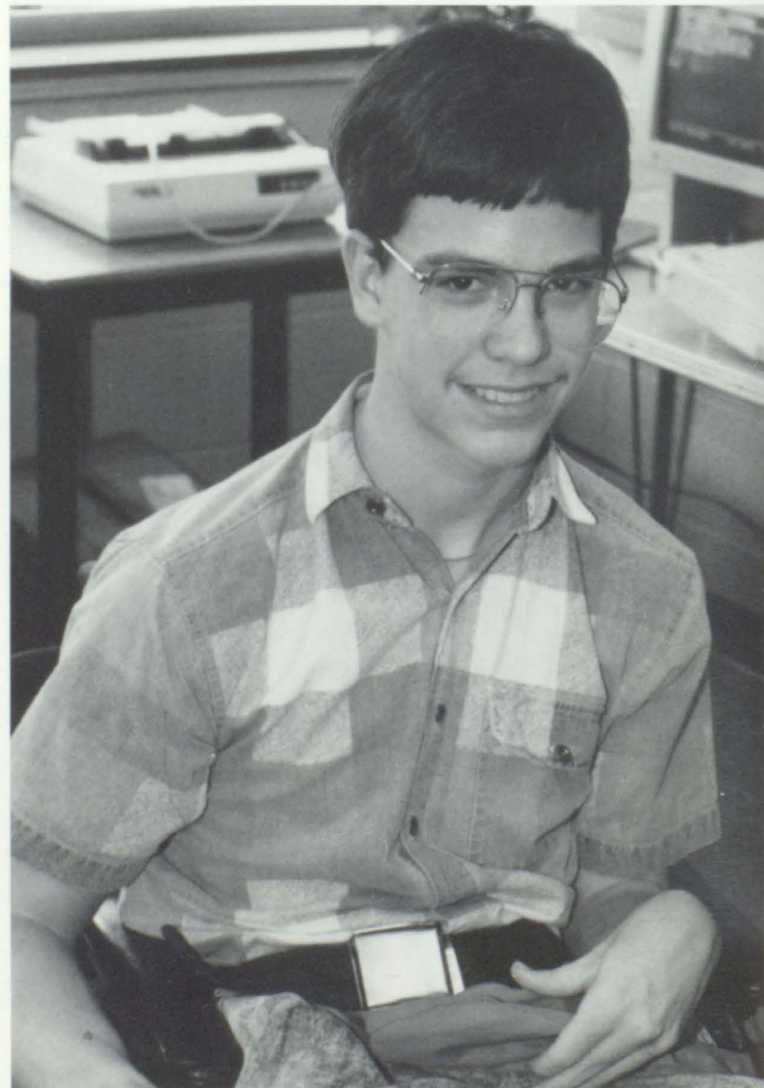

Foreign Language

Spanish, Serbo Croatian, Arabic, Chaldean, German, Italian, Romanian, Korean, Japanese, Bengali, Vietnamese, Chinese, Russian, Portuguese, Guyarti, and Farsi are many of the languages the students at Kimball High School speak. These students are enrolled in English as a second language (ESL) which is taught by Mrs. Salazar and Mrs. Hanna.

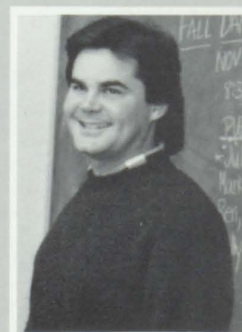

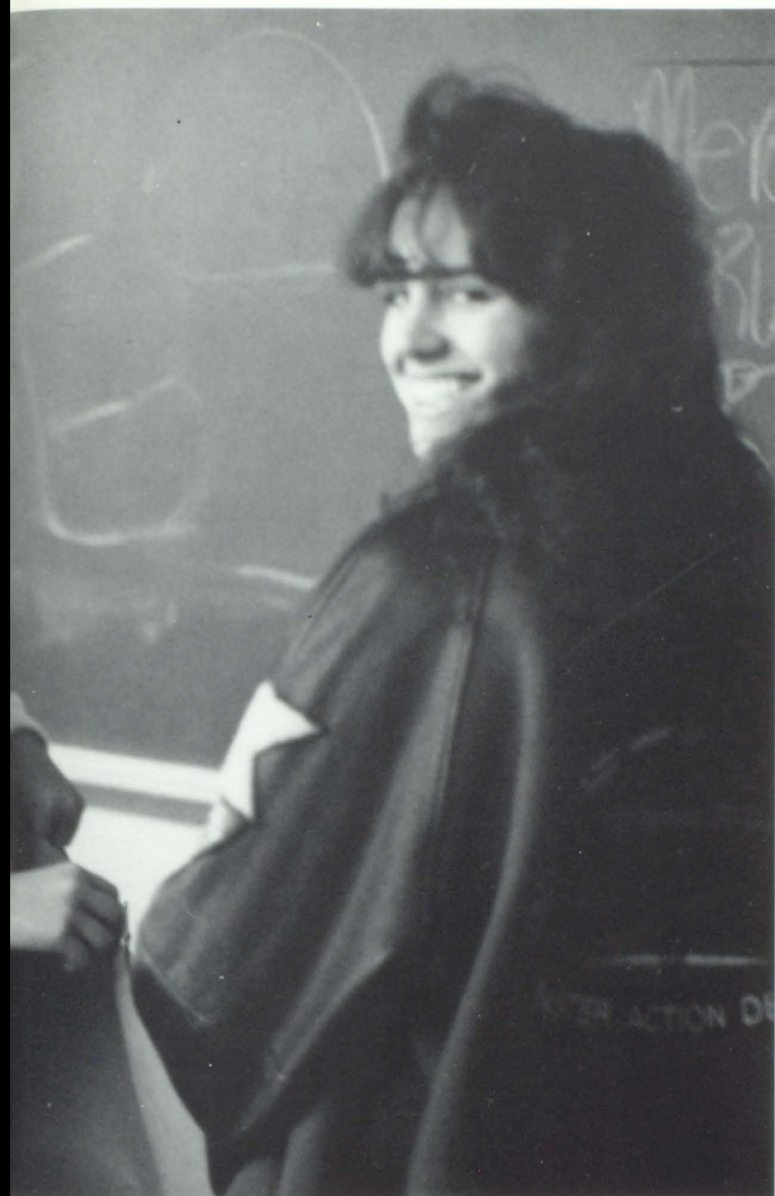

Teachers at OTC are very helpful and care a good deal about the courses they teach. You're not getting a cheap,

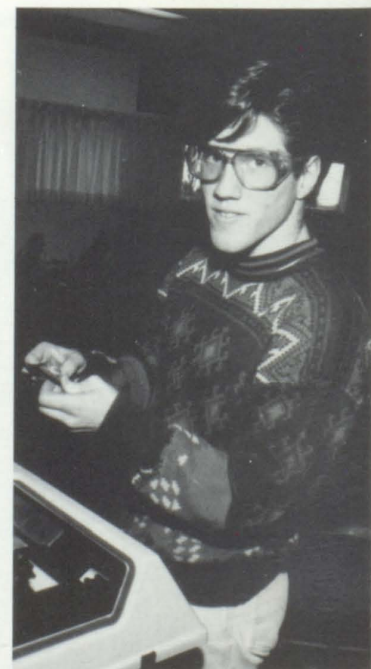
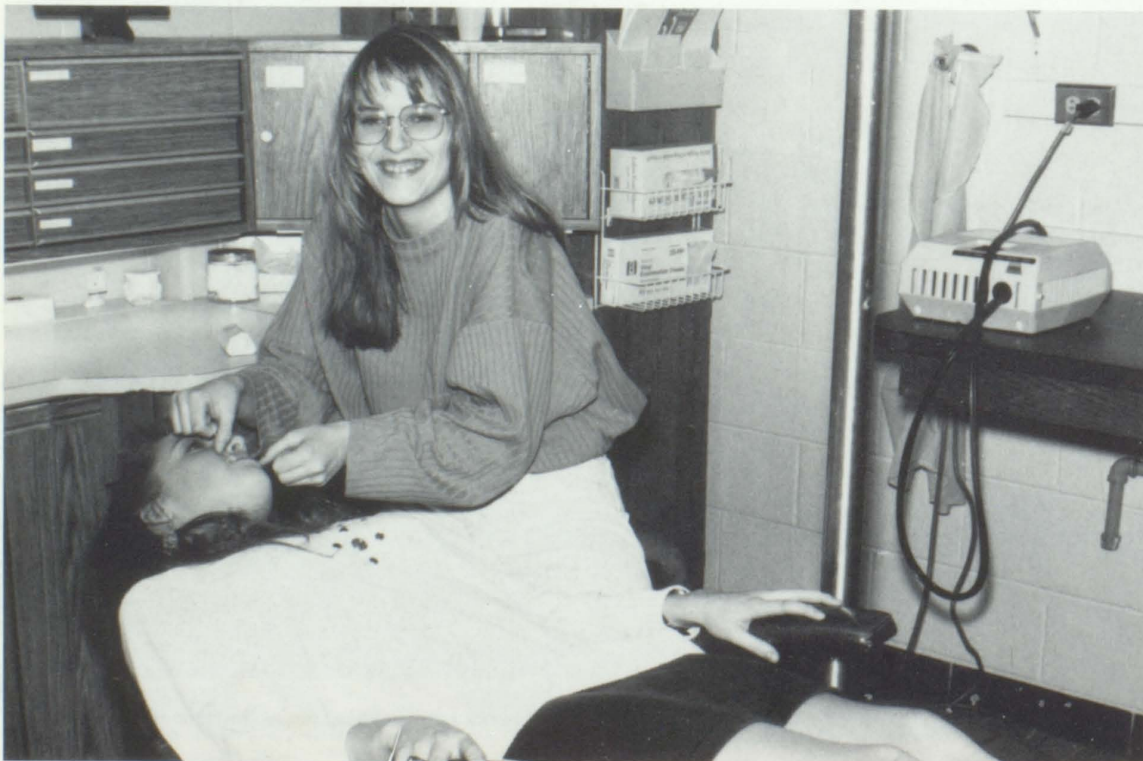
poorly taught education. In fact, you will probably learn more at OTC than taking classes at any other trade school.

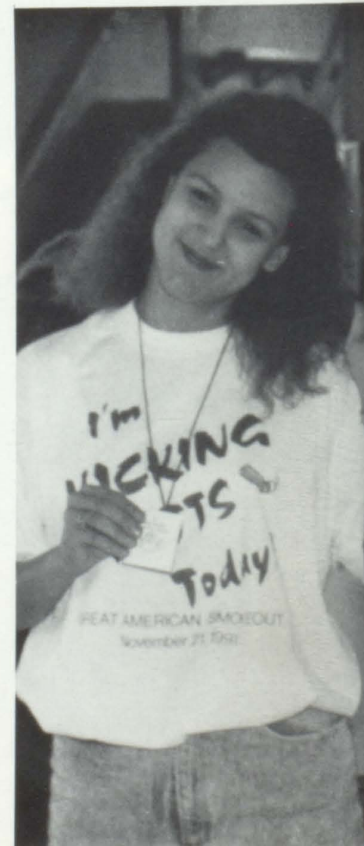

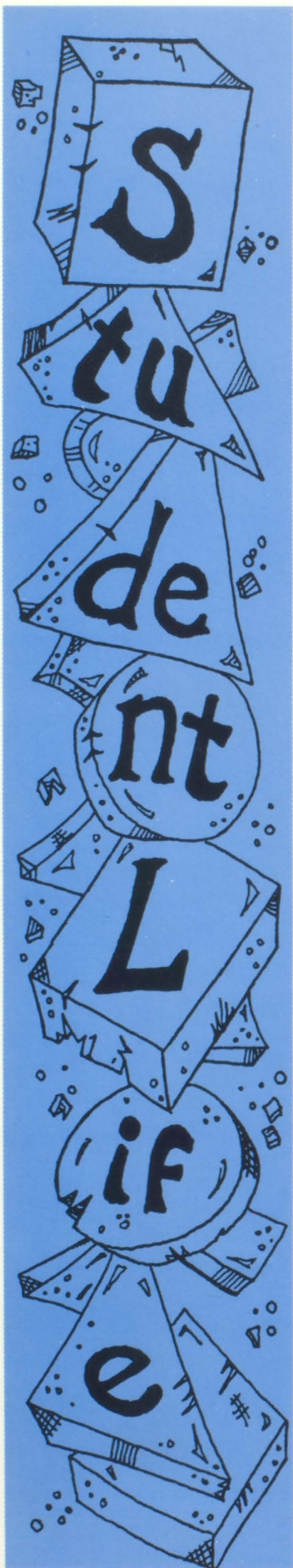

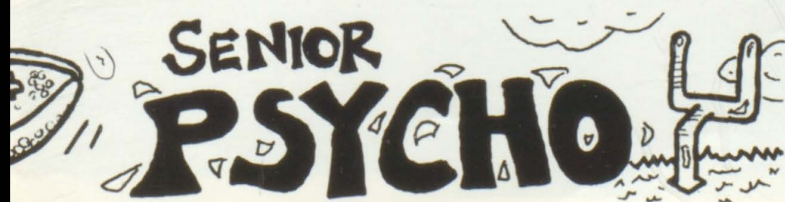

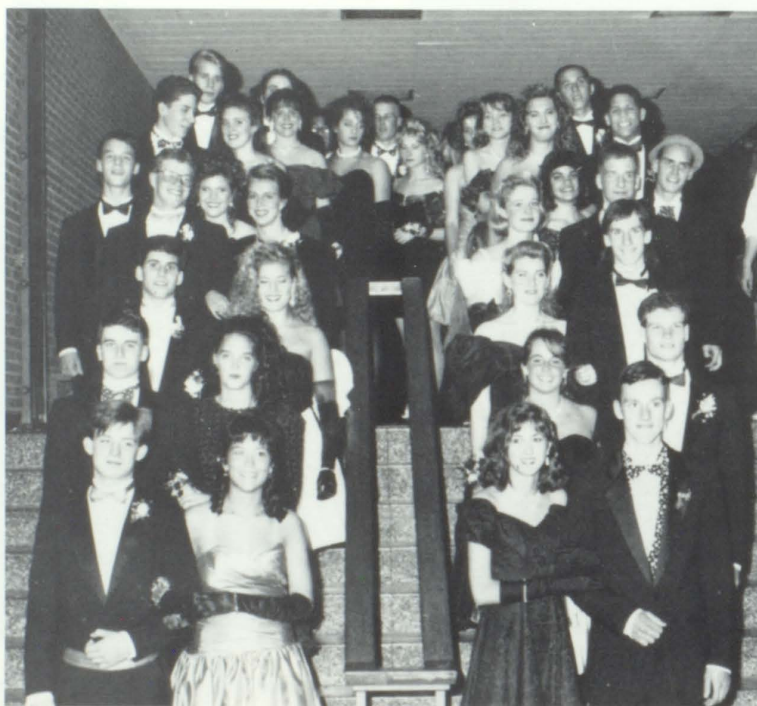

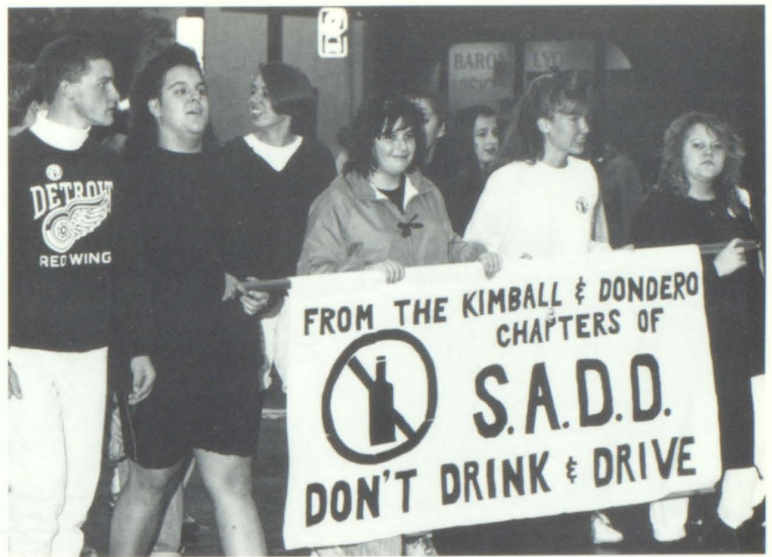

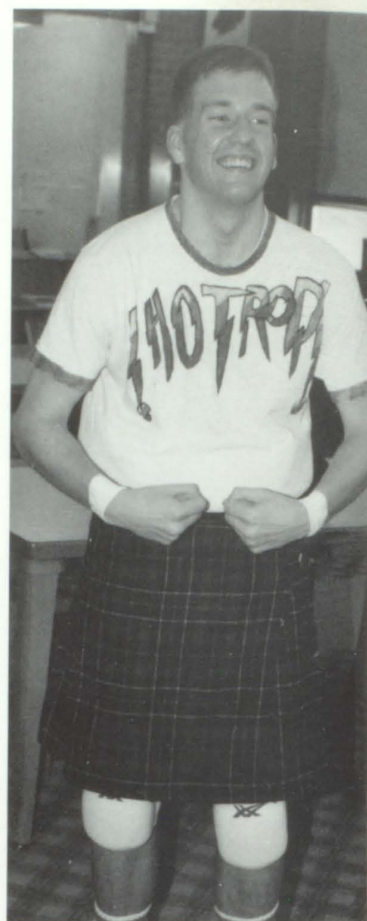

With all of the dedication and determination the members of the fall play cast and crew had, it's no wonder it was such a success.

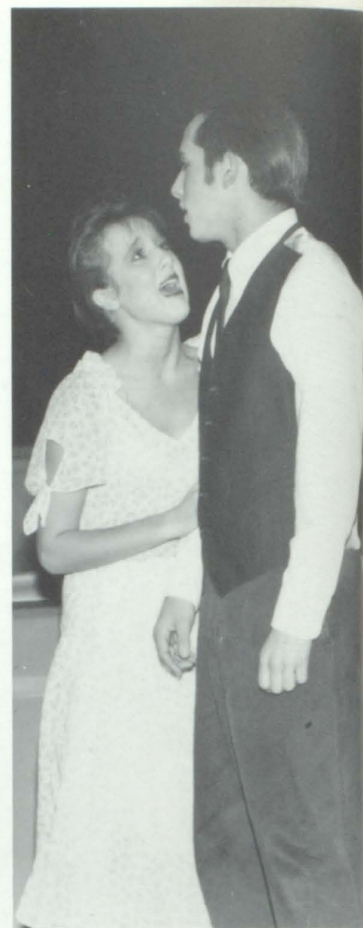

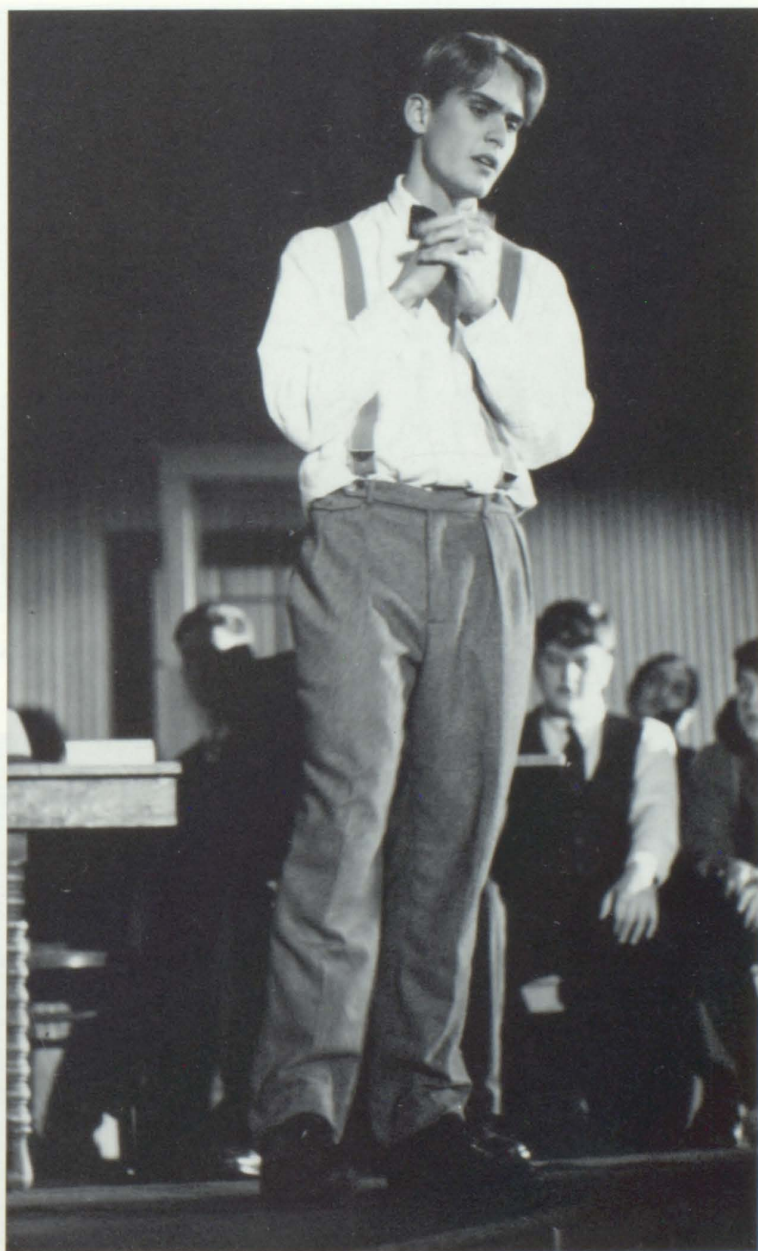

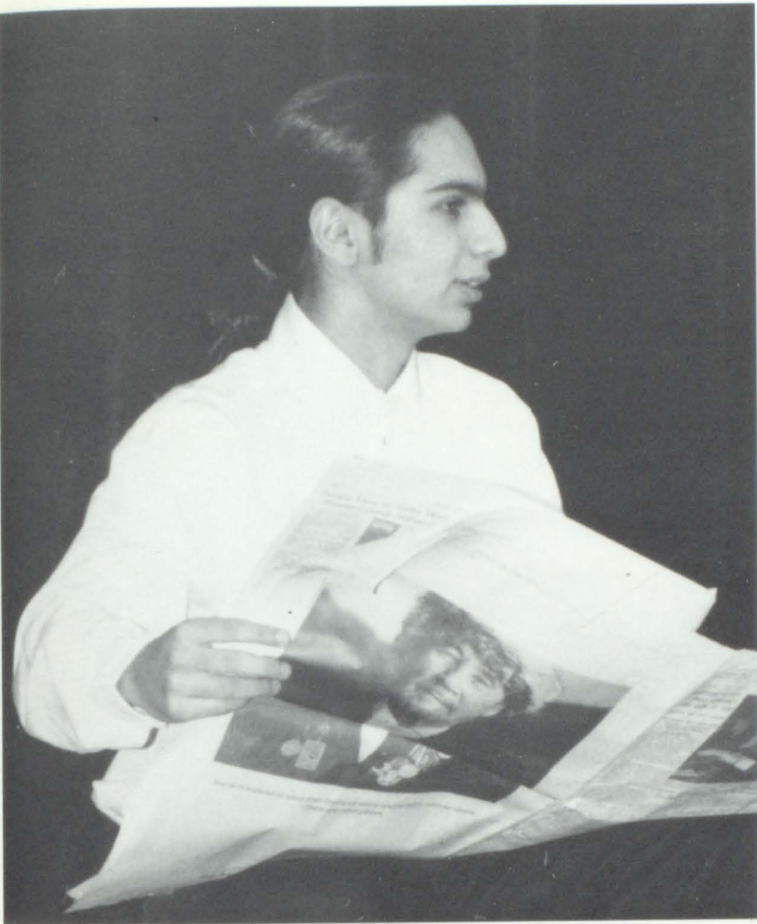

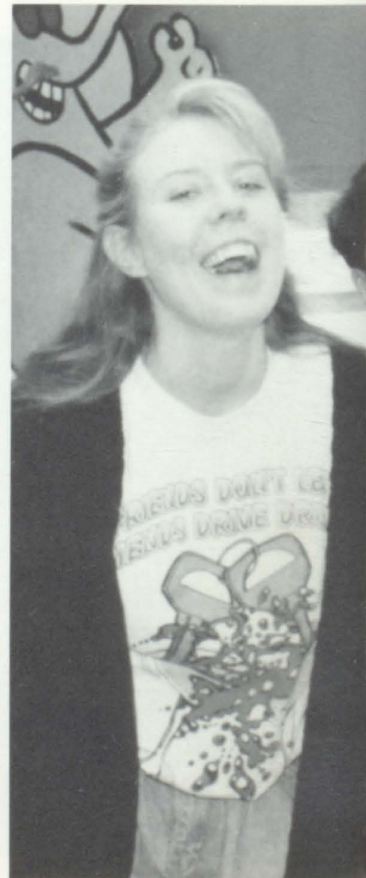

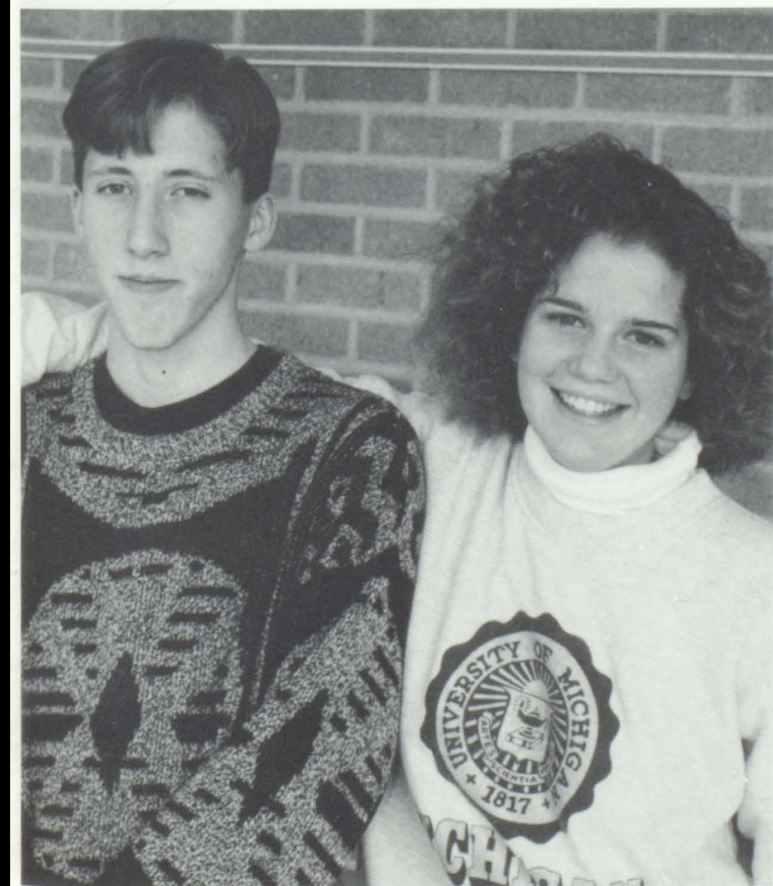

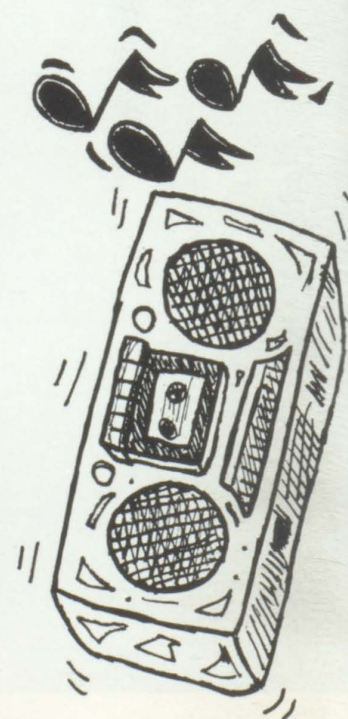

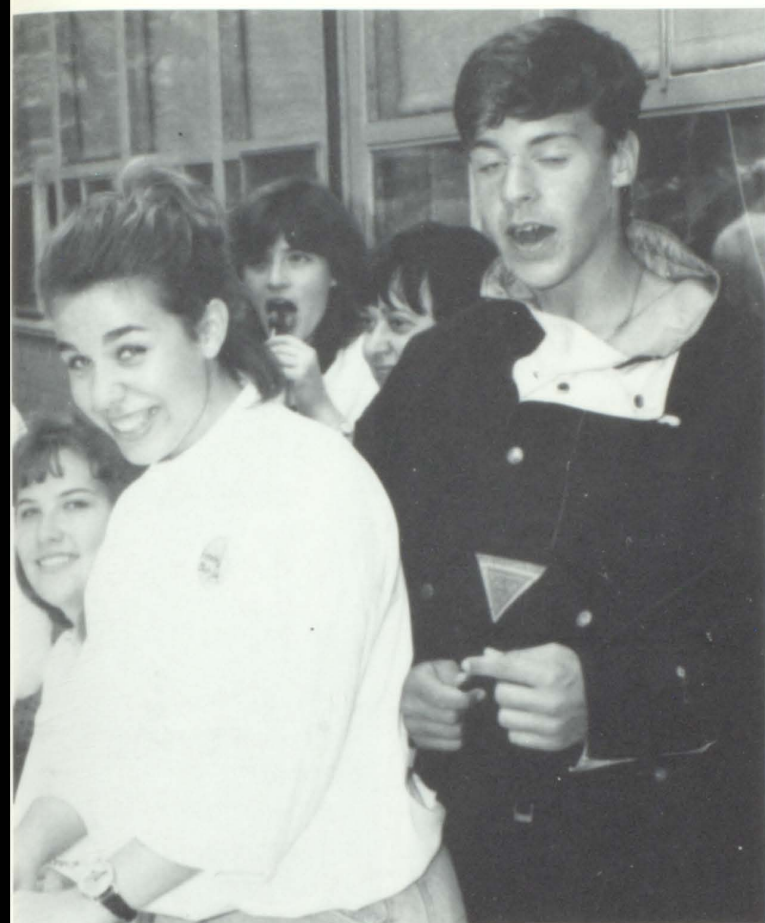

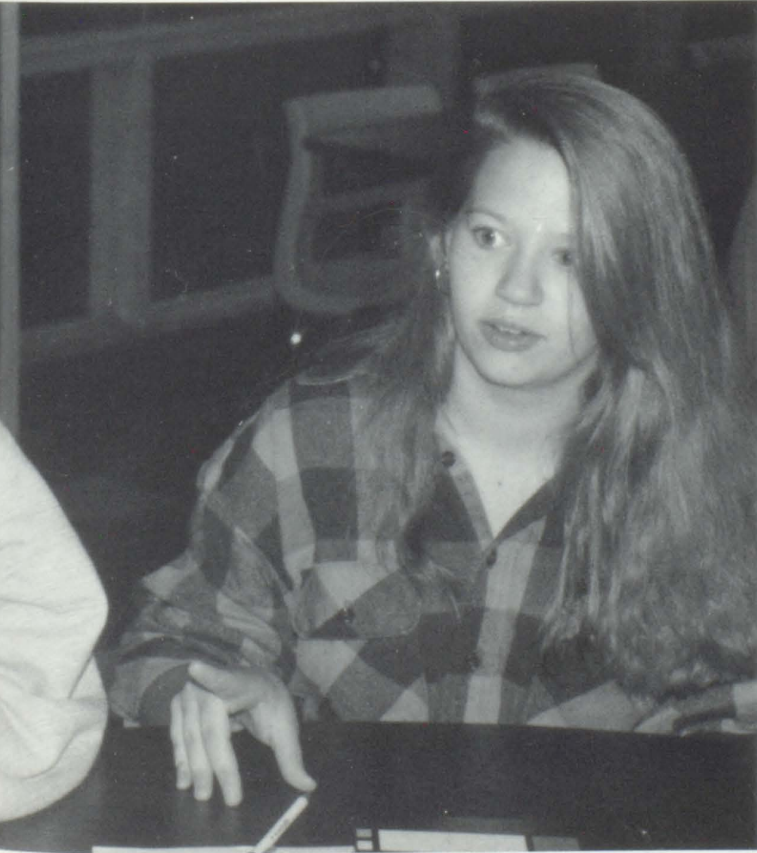

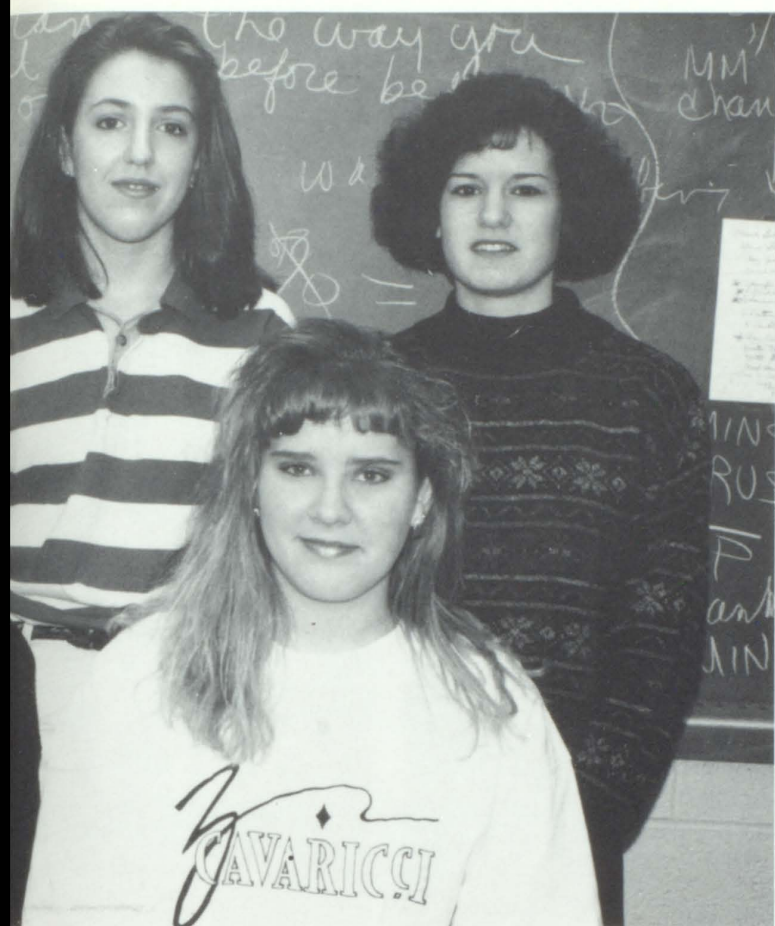

Chris Banish observed, "It's a great way to spend the first Tuesday of each month."

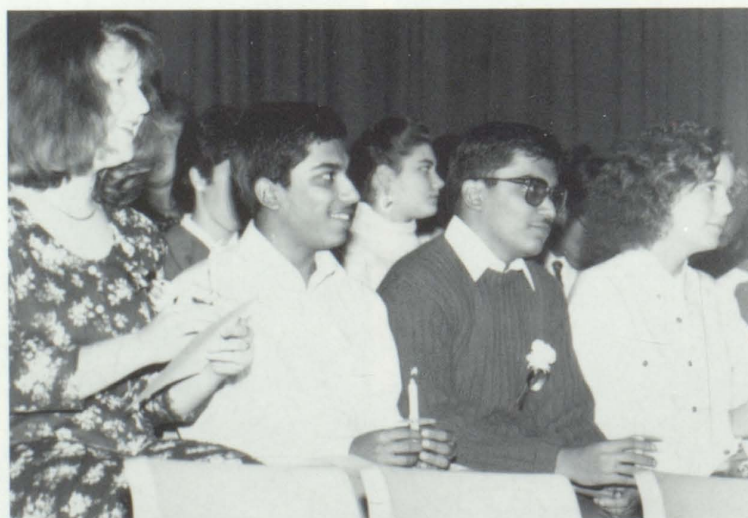
Dave Barnett, though, had even more to say: "Miss Fell makes NHS one of the finest organizations at Kimball."

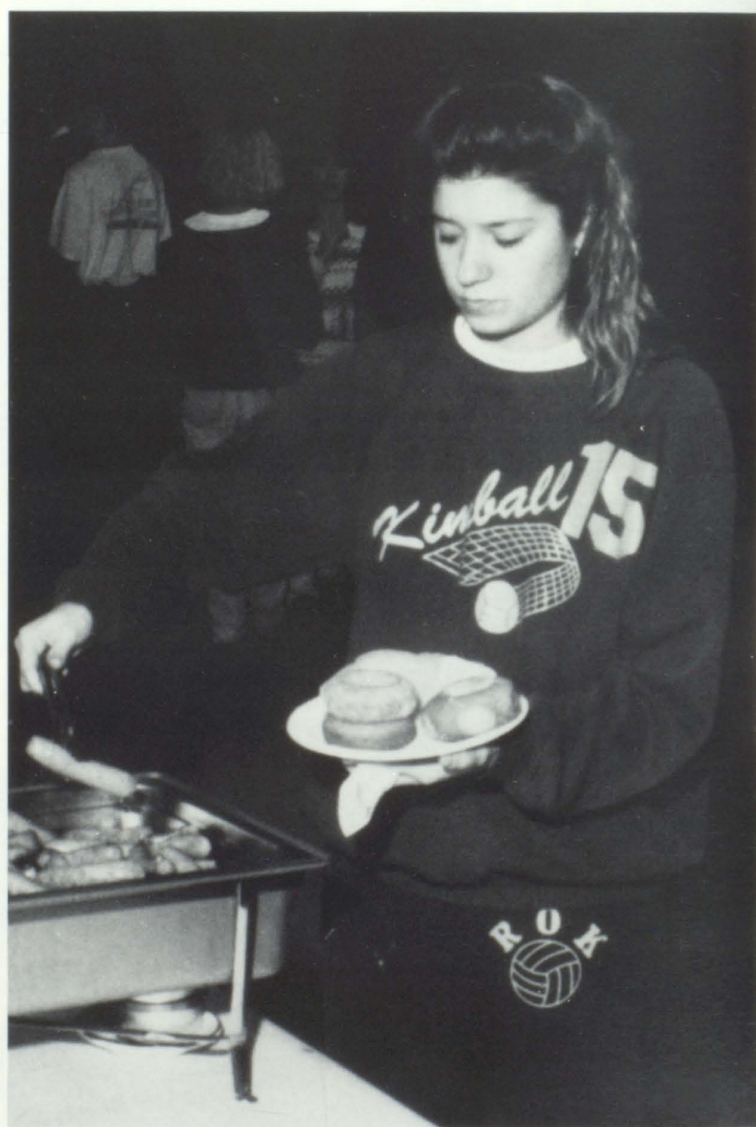

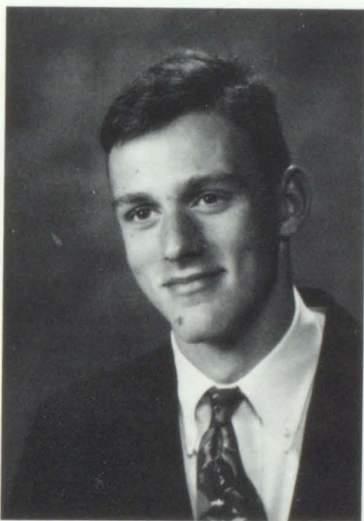

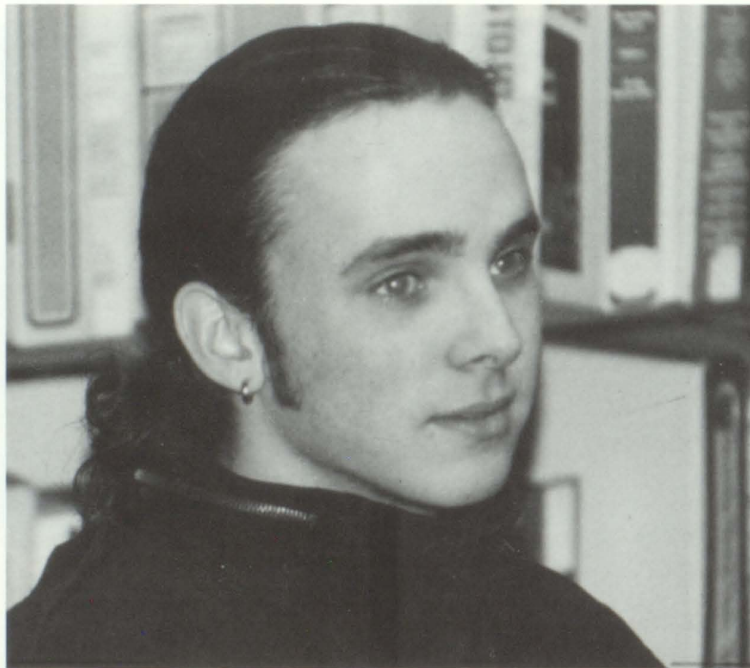
SEA

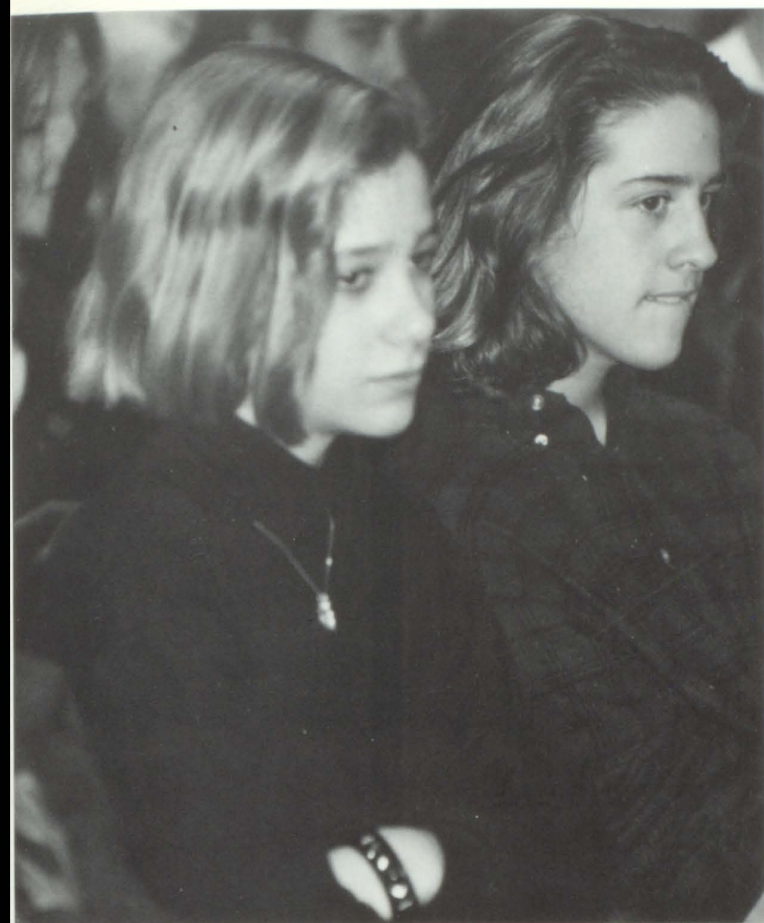

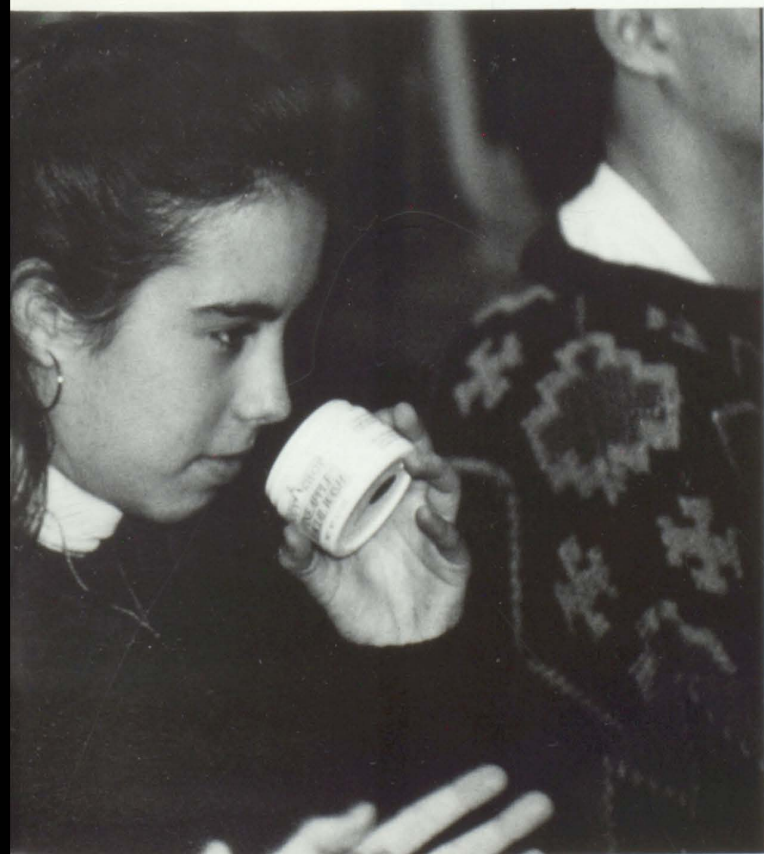

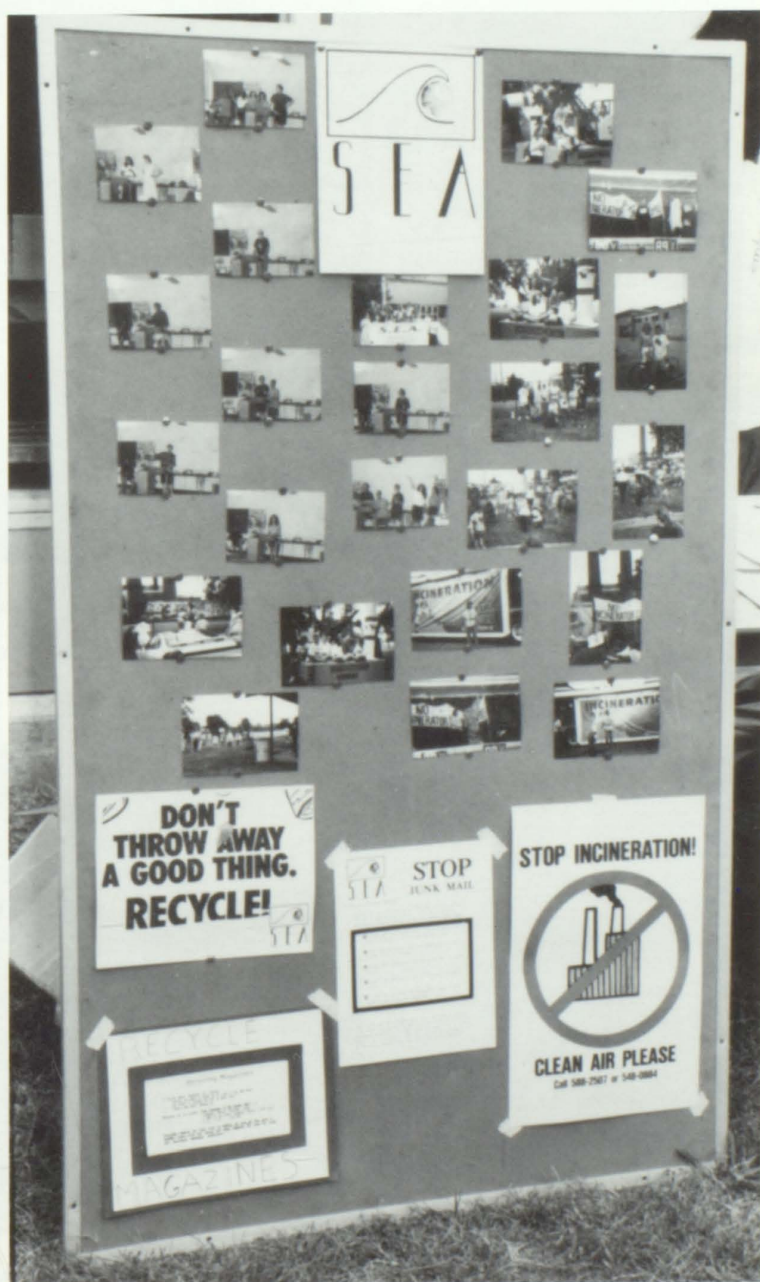

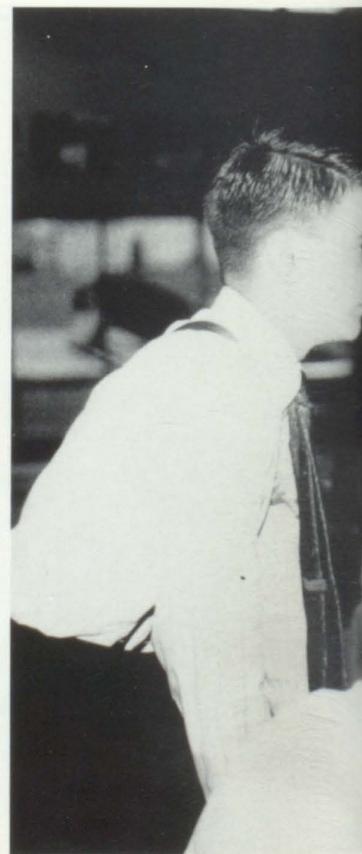

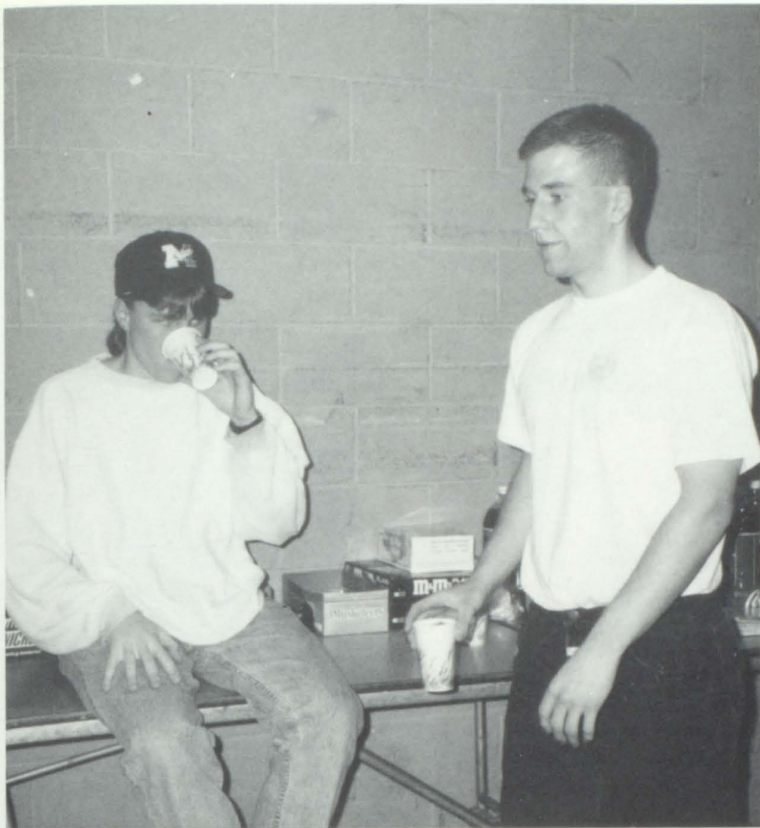

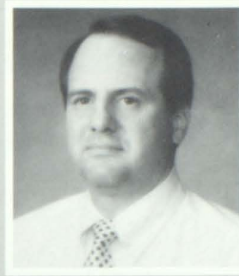

The 1991 Varsity Football season was filled with many expectations. Even with a disappointing 2-7 record, the 13 seniors, 16 juniors, and 3 sophomores learned a lot about each other and about football. The coaching staff had many positive things to say about the great leadership of the three senior captains: John Forti, Mike McDonald, and Jeff Barbato. "They contributed to the way this young group of men came together as a team and played hard," head coach Terry Powers said. "They were not only fine football players," assistant coach Mike Lewis remarked, "but also great students and tremendous, well-rounded gentlemen. Strength of character was something our captains always showed." Assistant coach Jim Fitzpatrick added, "Our senior captains were great leaders on the field. They performed the best they could, played with emotion, and showed a fine example of what Kimball football spirit is all about!"

Besides the usual goals a team sets for itself at the start of every season, team members had other, more personal goals. One such goal involved improving their skills, both physically and mentally. Junior defensive end Brad Martin "never wanted anyone to get outside of him when they had the ball." Others were focused on getting bigger, stronger, and faster, and being more "mentally there." Sophomore wide receiver and defensive back Jay Swan had hoped to "learn the Varsity system" and improve himself to be ready for next year. But senior running back and linebacker Matt Skoda best summed up every team member's desire: "To do the best that I can do!"

The Varsity players had differing views of their season. Wide receiver, defensive back, kick-return and punt-return specialist Jeff Barbato saw the season as a disappointment because he felt that "the team never reached its full potential." Junior half-back Tim Wisniewski thought of the 1991 season as "a learning experience." Junior running back and linebacker Brian McLaughlin described the season as "fun and enjoyable."

An important part of every team is the relationship between the coaches and the players, and between the players themselves. Quarterback and defensive back John Forti felt Coach Powers worked well with the team. "He made practices fun, and was concerned about his players," said Forti. Skoda said, "The coaches communicated with the players about life and about football. They put themselves on your level." "The relationship between the coaches and the players was a close one," McLaughlin said. "They wanted to get to know you as a person as well as a player," he added. Junior wide receiver Lance Sanders remarked, "The coaches were fair; you'd be told one-on-one why you weren't playing. They were strict and had the necessary discipline, but they also knew how to have fun." Senior offensive and defensive tackle Brett Greer added, "The coaches did an excellent job of try-

ing to bring the team together."

Regarding the relationship between team members, junior defensive tackle, tight end, and long snapper Derek Adams said, "We came together as a team as the season went on. At times we played together very well." Senior nose guard Shawn Smith, who plans on going into the Air Force after he graduates from high school said, "The coaches' communication and openness with the juniors and seniors helped our team come together better at the end." New-comer Tilo Schone described the Varsity Knights as "a real team with big spirit" wherein he felt comfortable and found some good friends to help him with his first and last year at Kimball. And in the words of Tim Wisniewski, "We were like a big family!"

Although every football game has its own special memories, some stood out from the rest. These included the season opener, Berkley, Seaholm, Homecoming, Troy, and the Silverdome game. For sophomore defensive lineman Mike Johnston, and junior fullback and outside linebacker Dave Wisniewski, East Detroit, the first game of the season, was a vivid memory. "It was the first Varsity game I had played in," Wisniewski said. And Johnston added, "It was a totally different feeling playing on Varsity for the first time."

Senior tailback Mike Silvers remembered his first start of the season against Berkley. Brad Martin also reminisced about the physical challenges of the Berkley game when he blocked and hit more than usual.

And junior wide receiver Kevin Nichols said, "Seaholm had the best defensive backs and toughest coverage I'd ever faced."

For senior Tilo Schone, Troy was his favorite game. During a kick off at the end of the game, he finally made his debut wherein he set his sights on the guy with the ball and made his first tackle and play of the year!

The last scheduled game of every season is played against cross-town rival Dondero, at the Pontiac Silverdome. This game had special significance to the seniors. As John Forti put it, "It was our last game as Kimball High School football players." Defensive linebacker, offensive tackle, punt and punt return team specialist Mike McDonald had this to say: "We've beaten Dondero for the last four years. This year we broke tradition. The game against archrival Dondero is the sin-

gle most important game of the season. It's built up by everyone, not just the team." Coach Lewis agreed: "We prepared very hard and looked forward to our Silverdome showdown. Unfortunately Dondero had a very good team and came out on top."

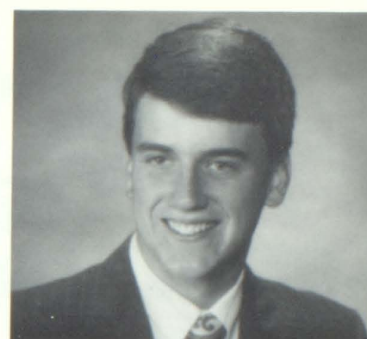
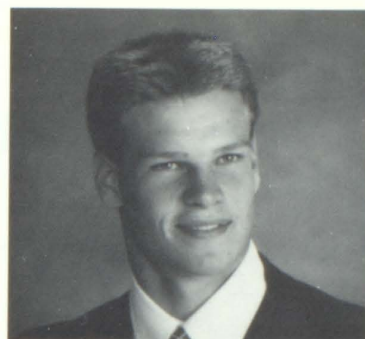
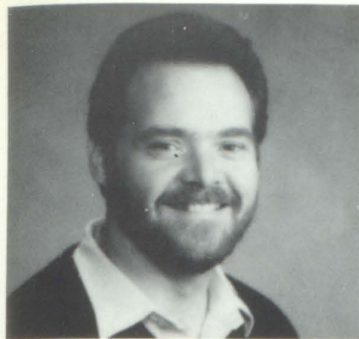
Almost everyone would agree that

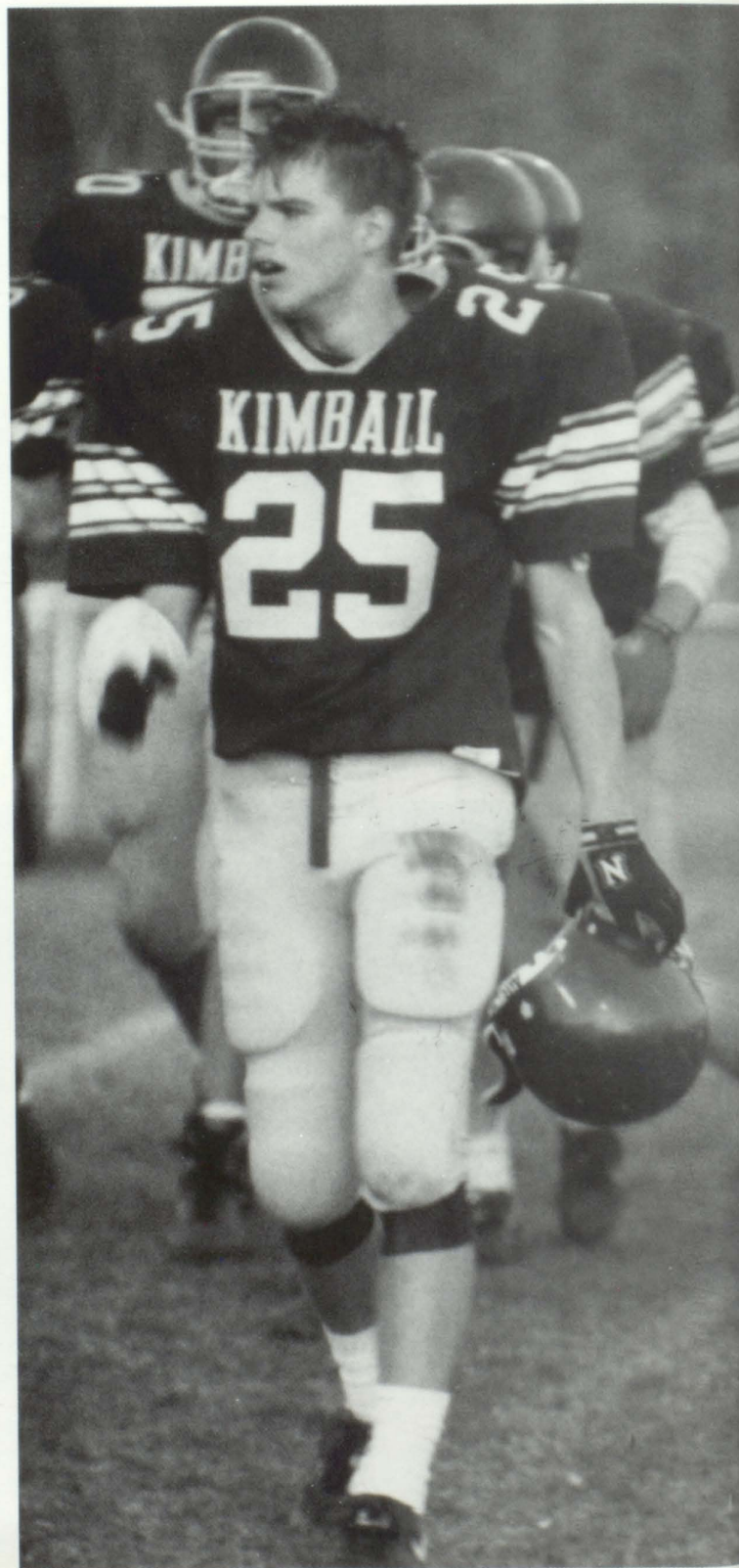
"Last year we were just getting to know each other, this year we could just play," stated Corey Reiser.

Though much of the JV team will be moving up to the Varsity team next year, many will always remember playing JV.

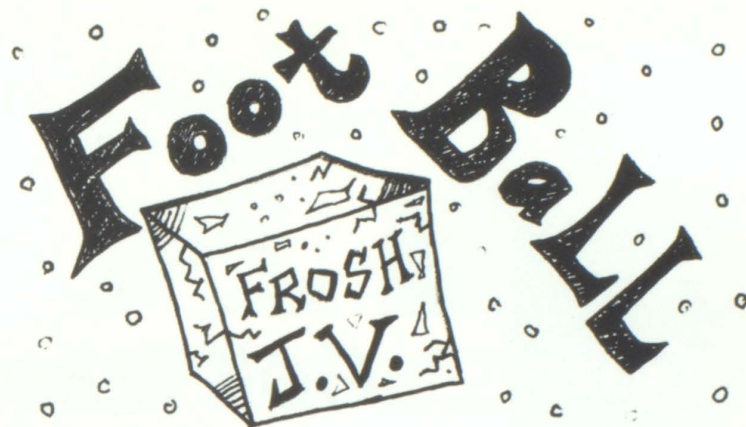
"Playing JV was fun and really got me ready for Varsity next year," stated Lou Alfalah.

Shooting For Greatness

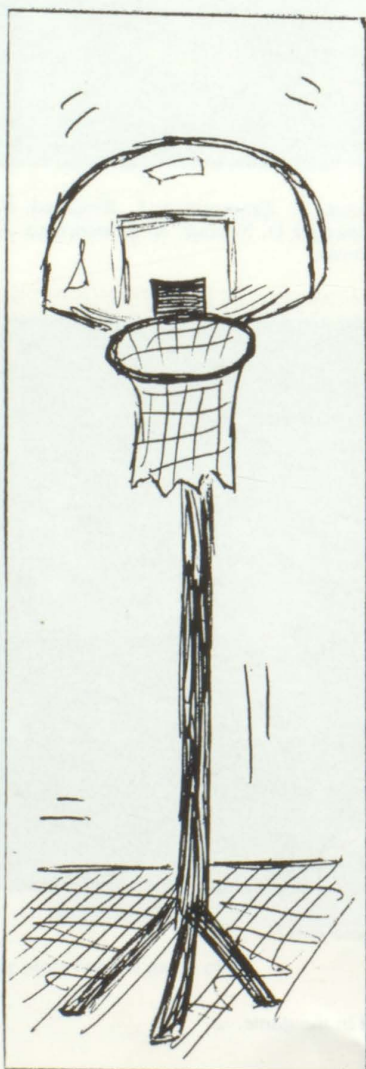

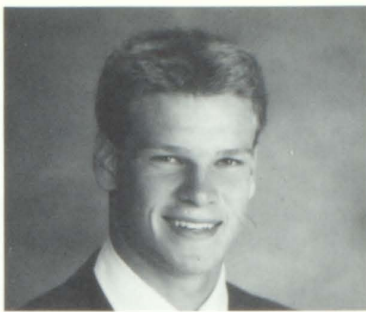
the team manager, is always there to pick up any extra jobs the coaches or players need him to do.

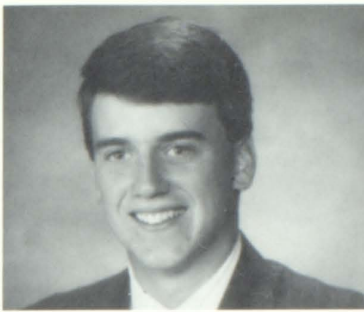

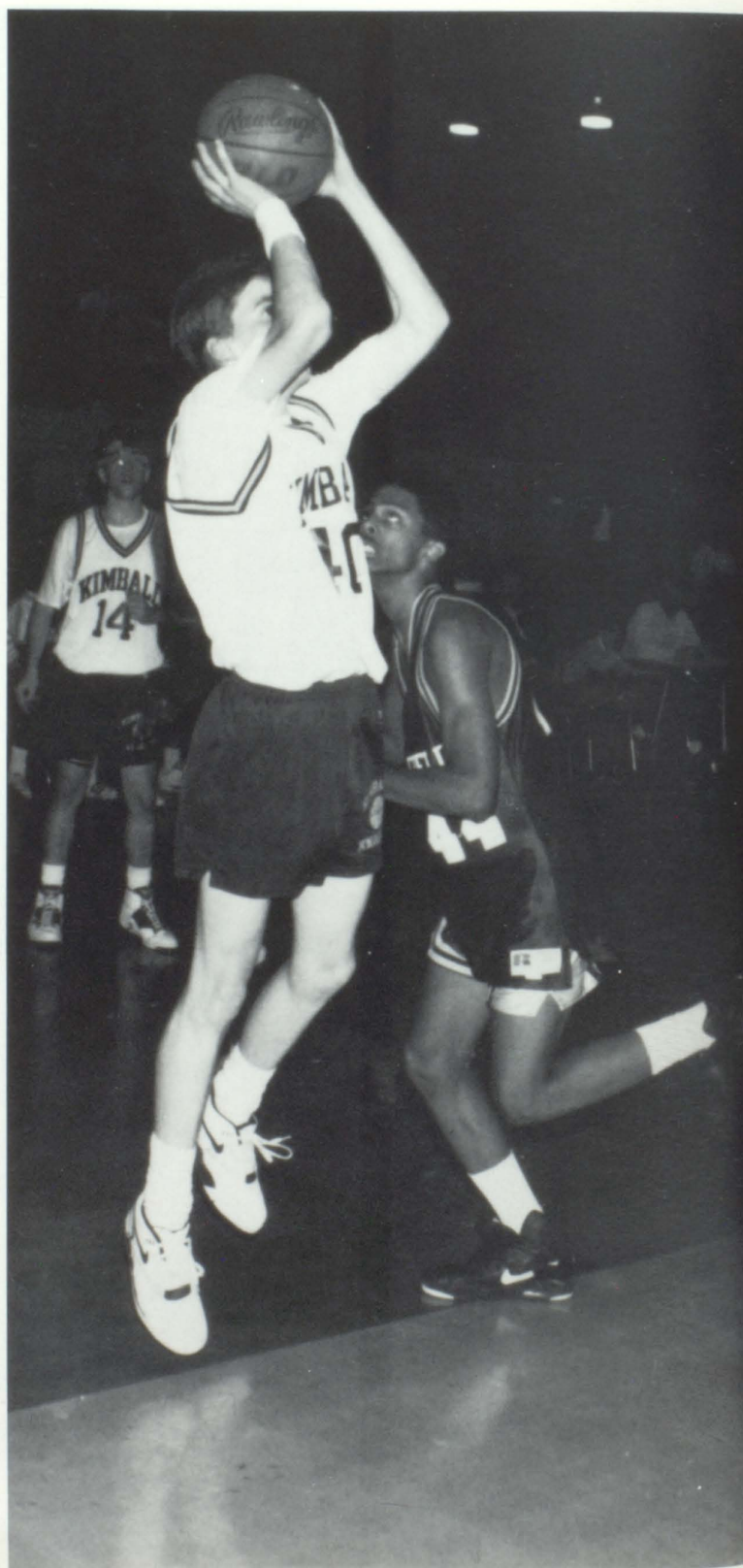

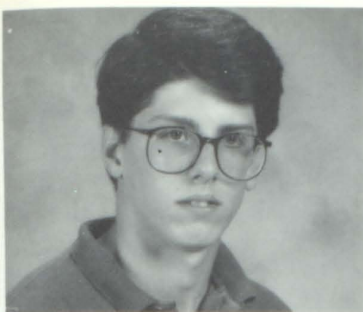

The Boys Swimming and Diving teams have definitely made a gigantic splash this year! These guys have taken a strenuous and challenging sport and come out as winners.

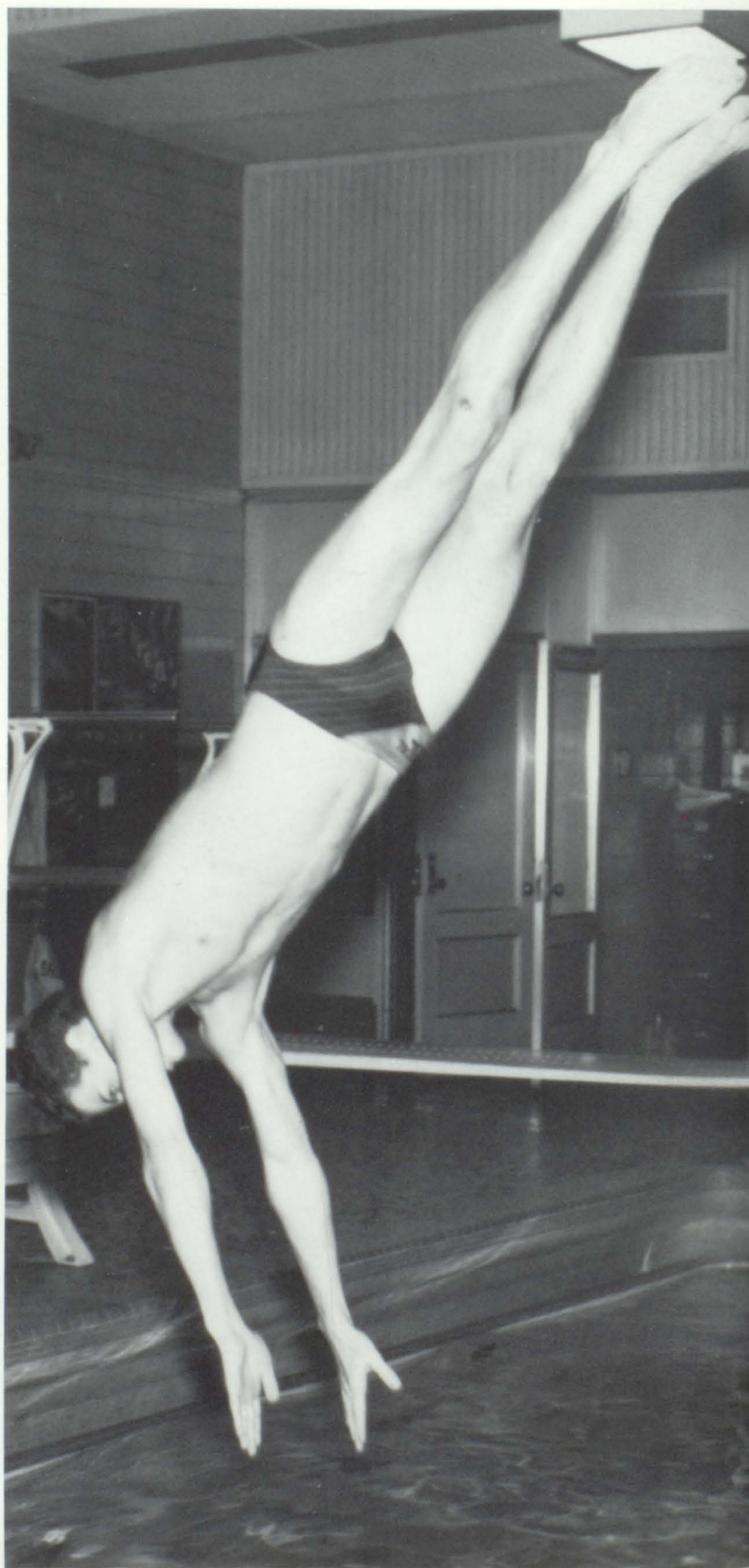

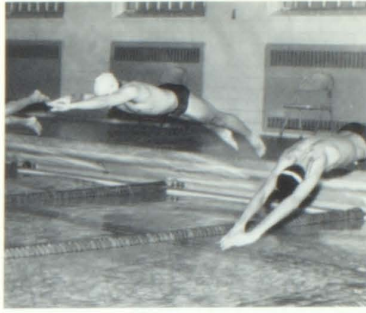

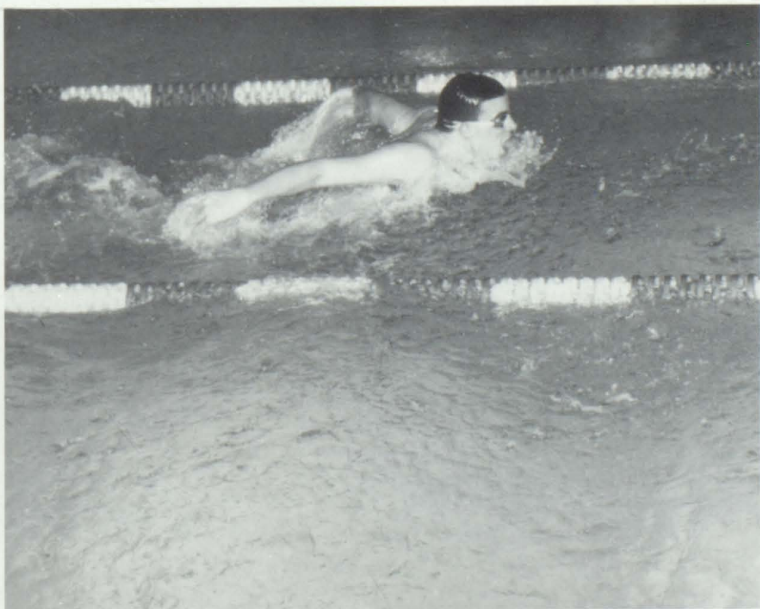

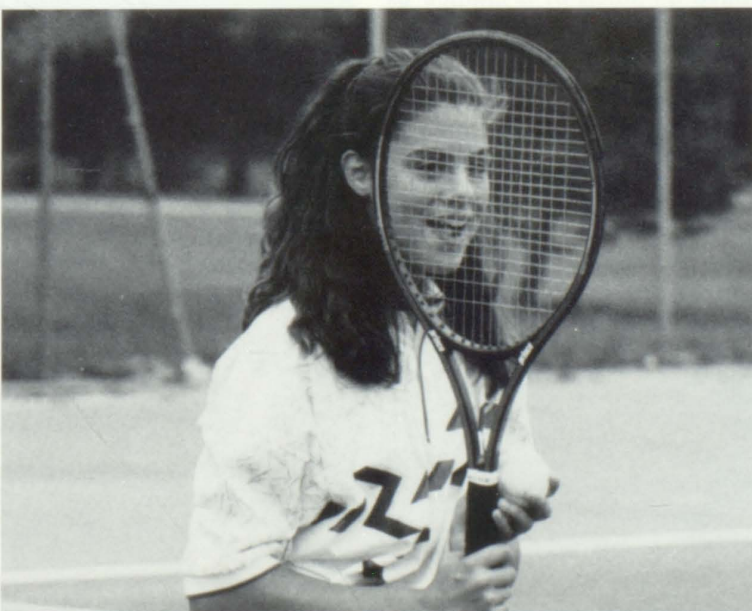

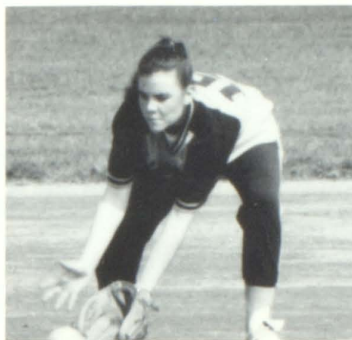

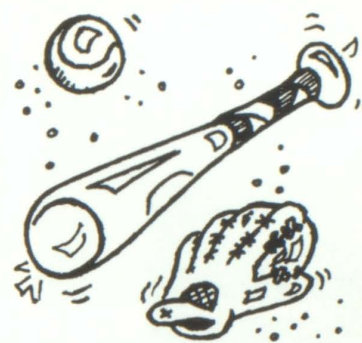

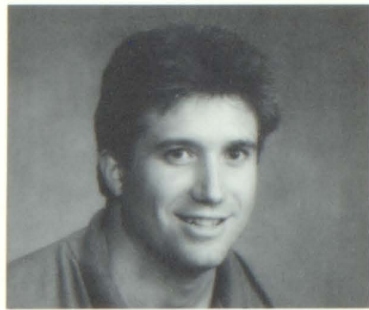

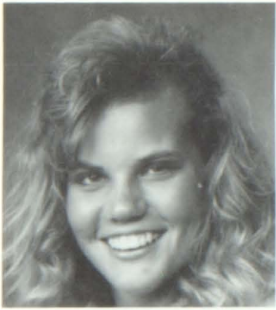

The Varsity team had an impressive year and an excellent game against Catholic Central. Congratulations to all of the graduating Seniors and all of the players on the team.

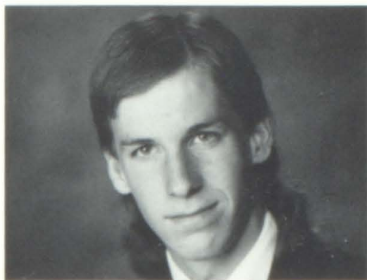

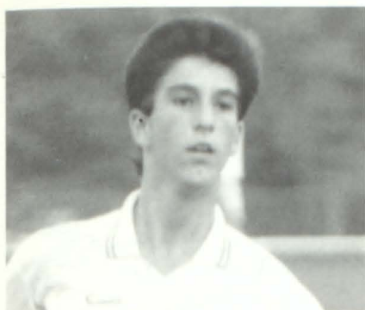

"I just go out there to win, and only to win. Before every match I try to set in my mind that I can win, and just go out there and do it," Junior Corey Keltner replied.

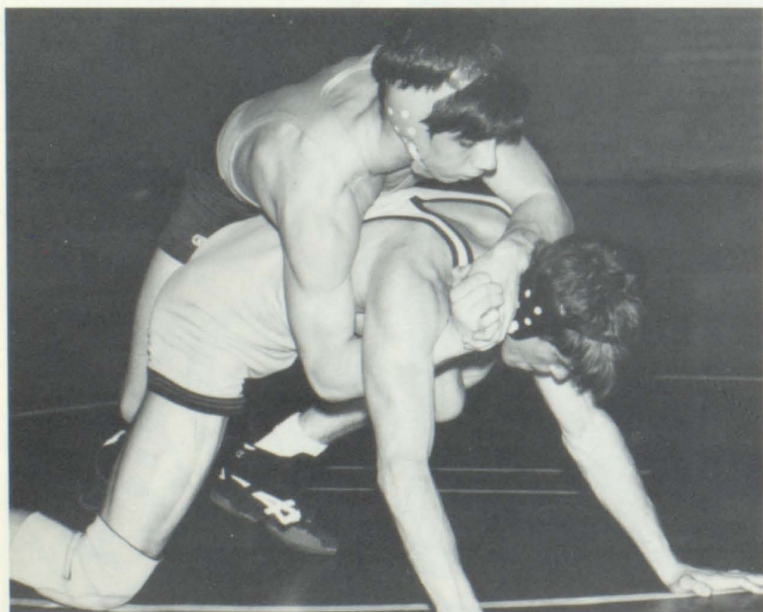
"I feel total adrenaline," the other team captain, Junior, Derek Adams said.

Each wrestler has to watch his weight so they can fit into their weight class. Sometimes this means starving themselves.

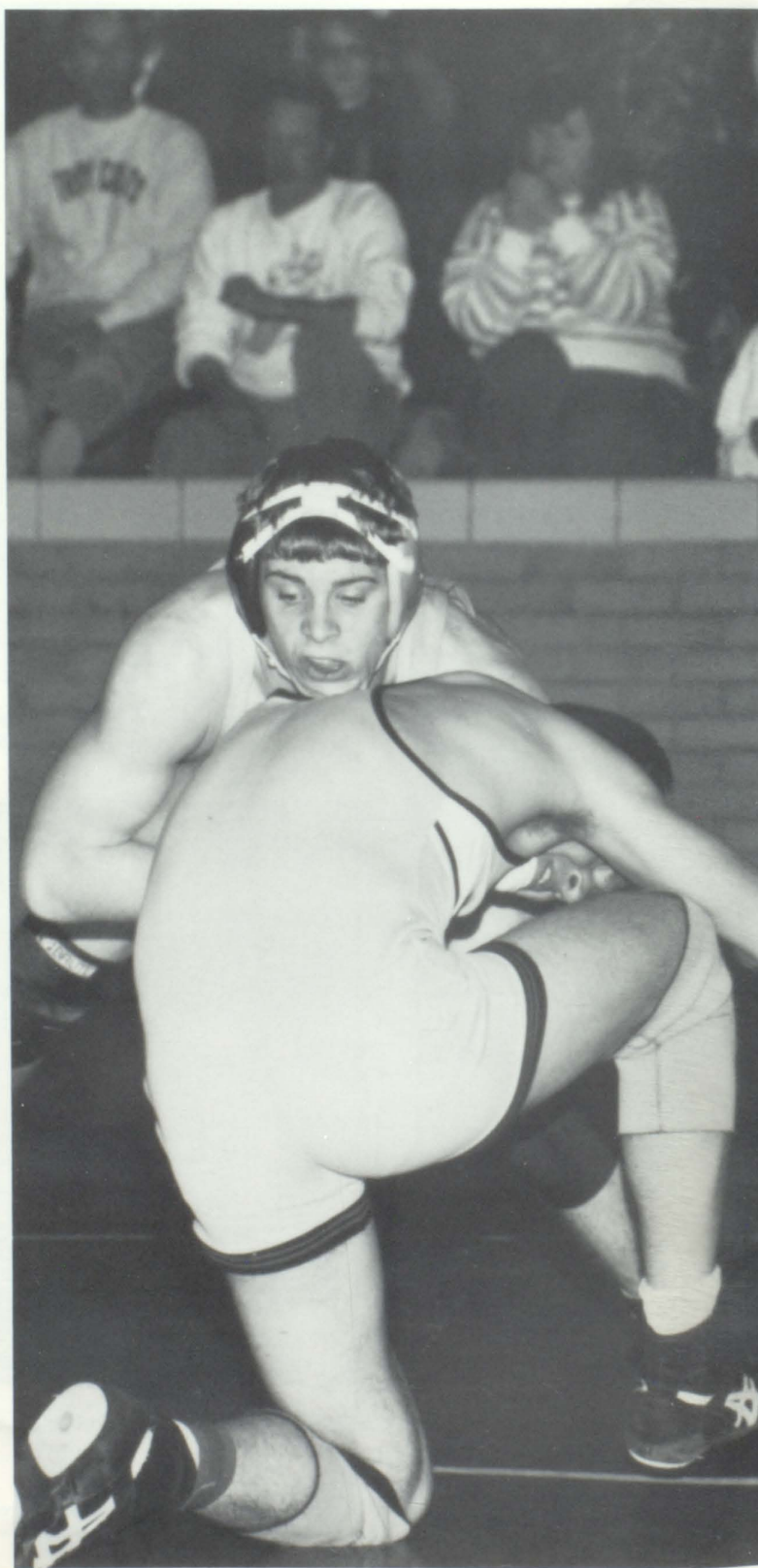
"I like cutting weight the least," Derek Adams also stated.

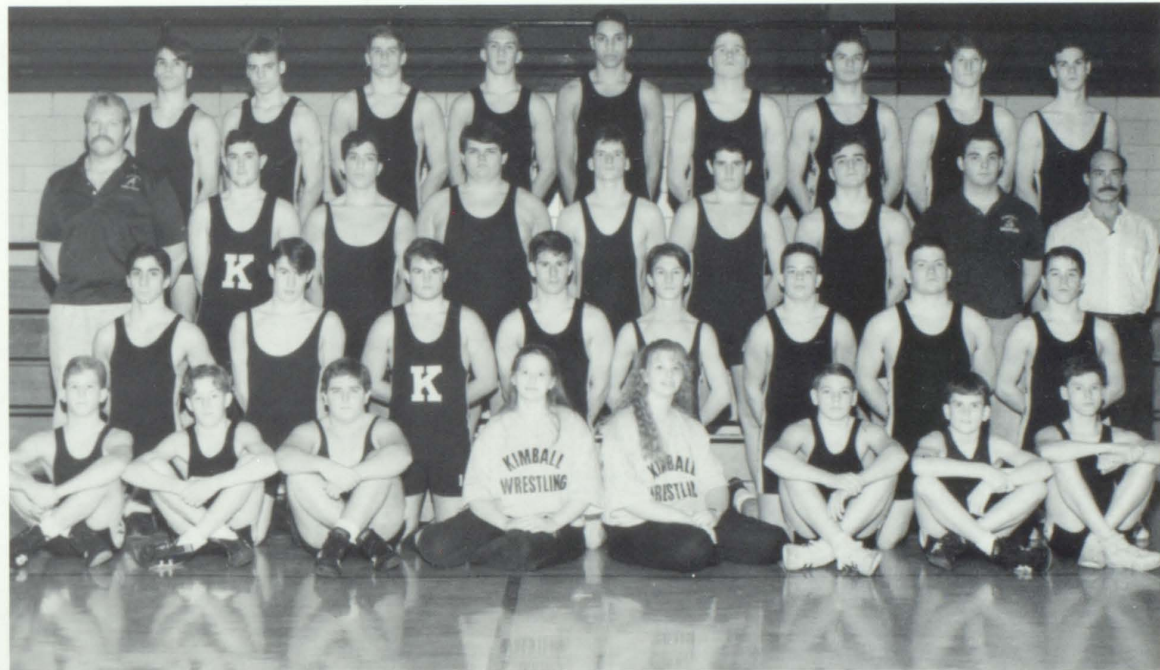

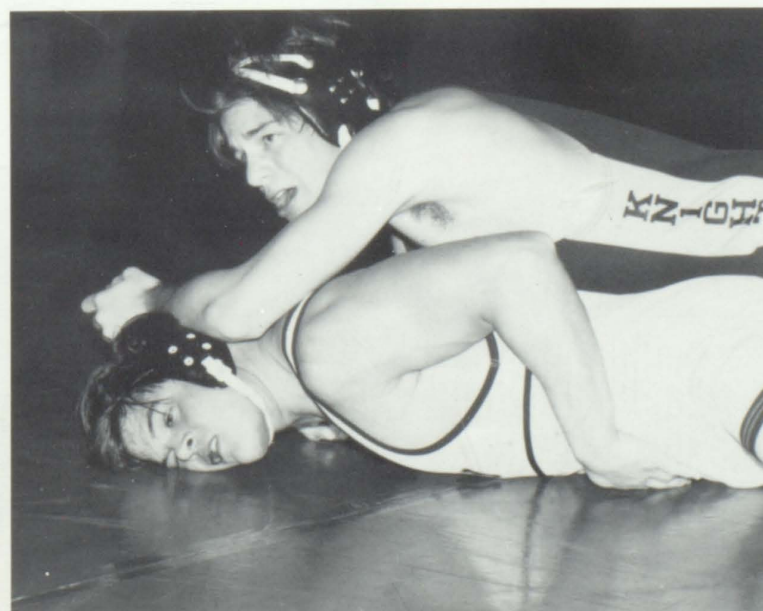

Finishing off his fifteenth year as head coach, Mr. Ewell is leading Kimball's Gymnastics team to an explosive season.

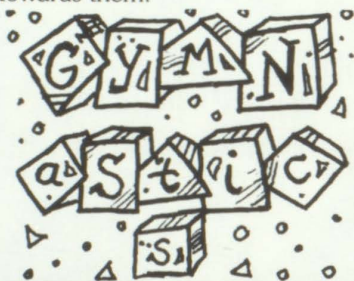

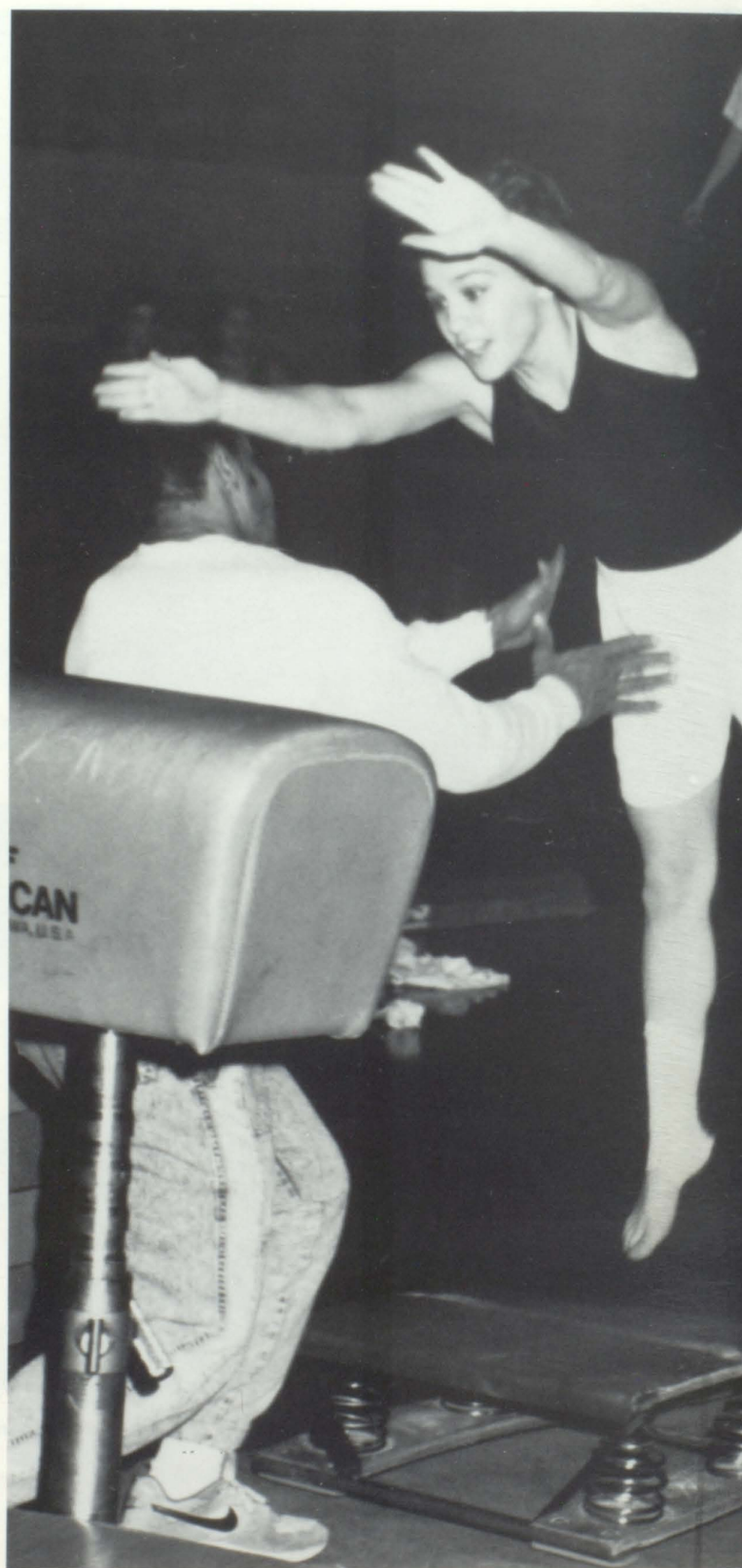

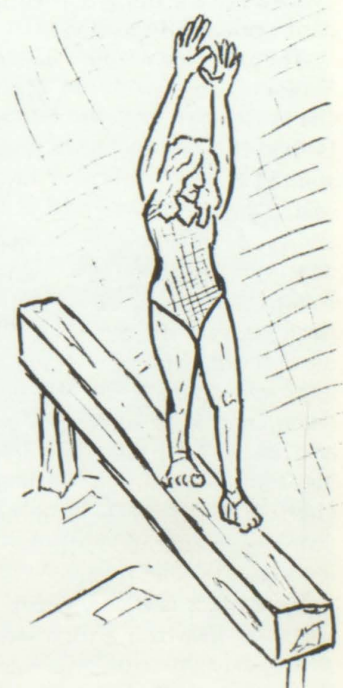

The coup in the Soviet Union began on August 19, 1991. An eight man committee led by Vice President Genady Yanayev took power from President Mikhail Gorbachev. Yanayev said Gorbachev was ill. As Russian President Boris Yeltsin called on Russians to resist the coup, tanks and other military gear moved into Moscow.

On Tuesday, August 20, President George Bush was joined by the European Community and demanded Gorbachev's return to power. And three of the leaders of the eight man ruling committee were said to step down.

On Wednesday, August 21, the leaders of the coup were reported to have fled Moscow. Tanks and armored personnel carriers moved away from the Russian Parliament and leaders of the national legislature demanded that Gorbachev be returned to power. The Communist Party denounced the takeover.

On Thursday, August 22, Gorbachev returned to Moscow before dawn and resumed power.

The coup may have ended communist rule in the Soviet Union, but it began a series of reforms and changes that will continue for years to come.

One of the biggest changes was in the Baltic states. Three Baltic states declared their independence from the Soviet Union. Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia have different languages, religions, and cultures. Lithuania, about half the size of New York State, has 3.7 million people and is predominately Catholic. Latvia is about the same size as Lithuania and has 2.7 million people and almost half are non-ethnic Latvians. The Lithuanian and Latvian languages have some similarities, but Estonian is related to Finnish. Estonia, with 1.6 million people, is 30% ethnic Russian. Estonians and Latvians are mainly Lutherans.

select rooms will be installed with air. Two of these locations are the cafeteria and the library.

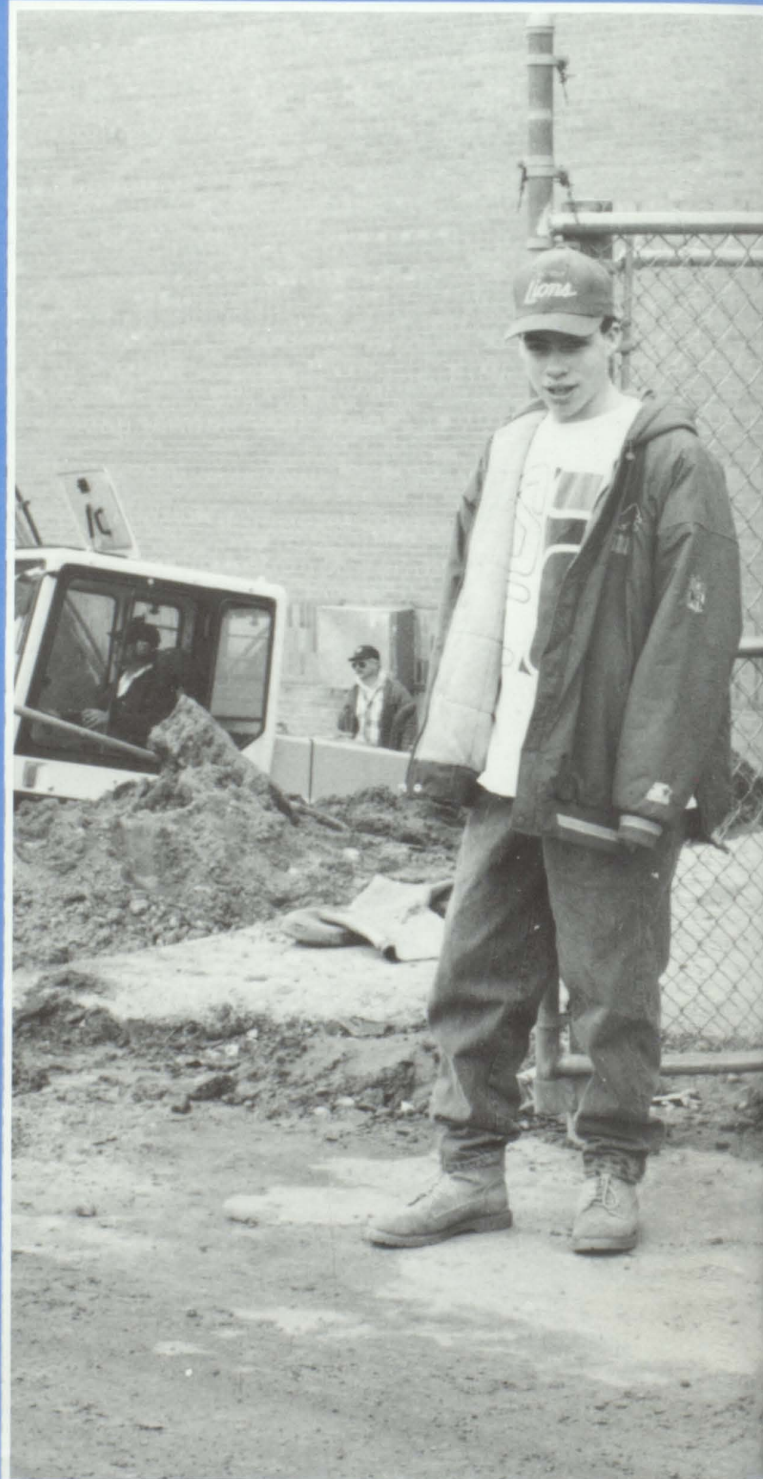

The fact that Kimball is being totally renovated to the point where juniors, seniors, and all former students may not recognize the new and improved Kimball disappoints some students while it excites others.

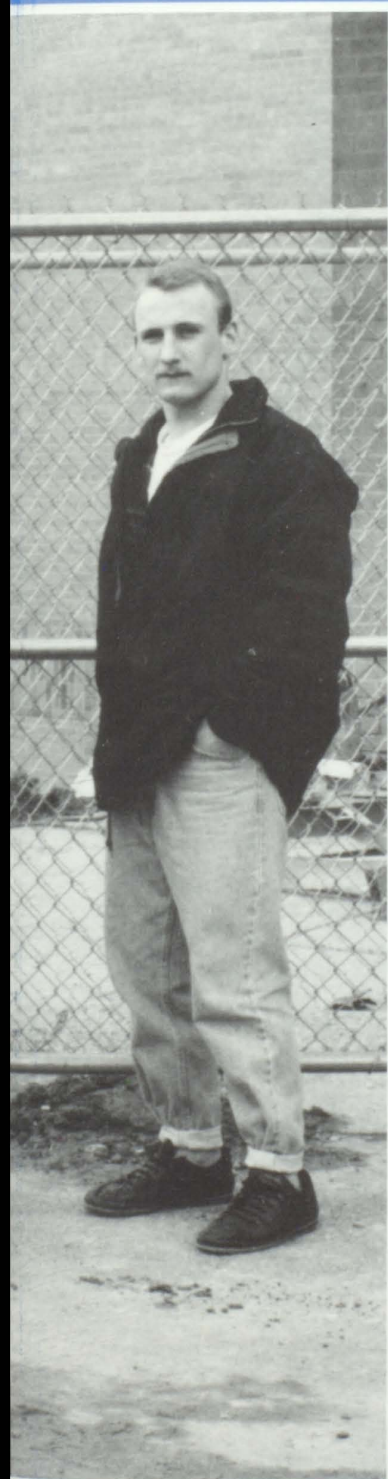


Bartin Marlon Construction company starts the much awaited renovation of Kimball High School.

One of the many Barton Marlow Construction workers seen around Kimball watches over the crane as it digs into the ground. Kimball students begin to become curious about exactly what is happening.

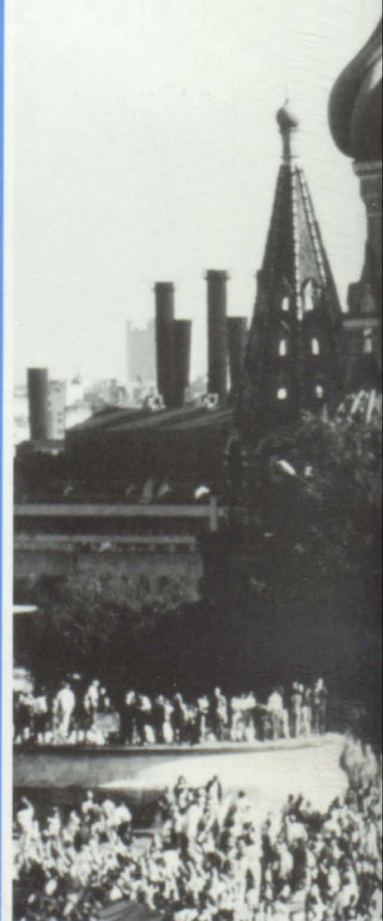

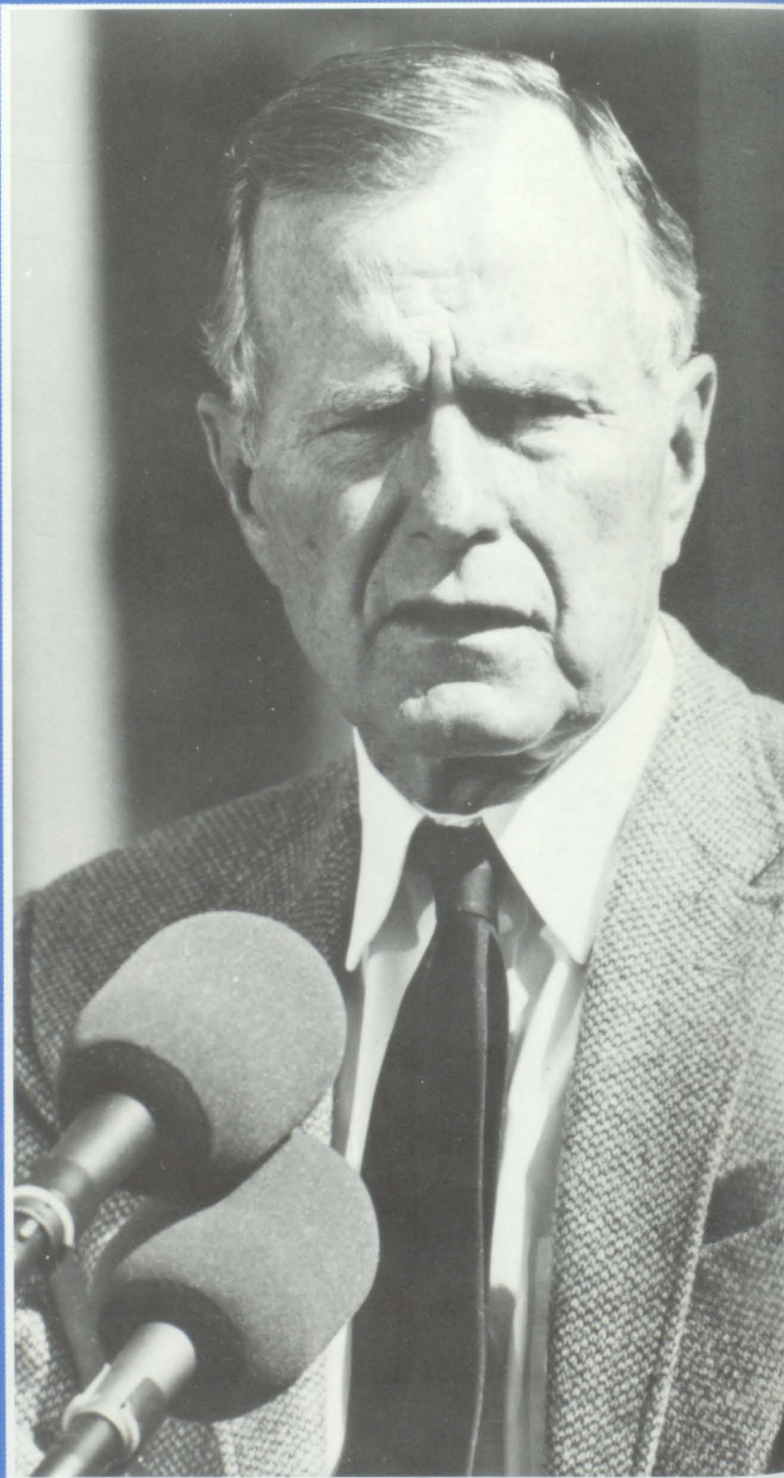
In state news, Michiganders picked a new Governor. Republican Governor **John Engler** replaced ex-Democratic Governor **Jim Blanchard** in the polls this year.

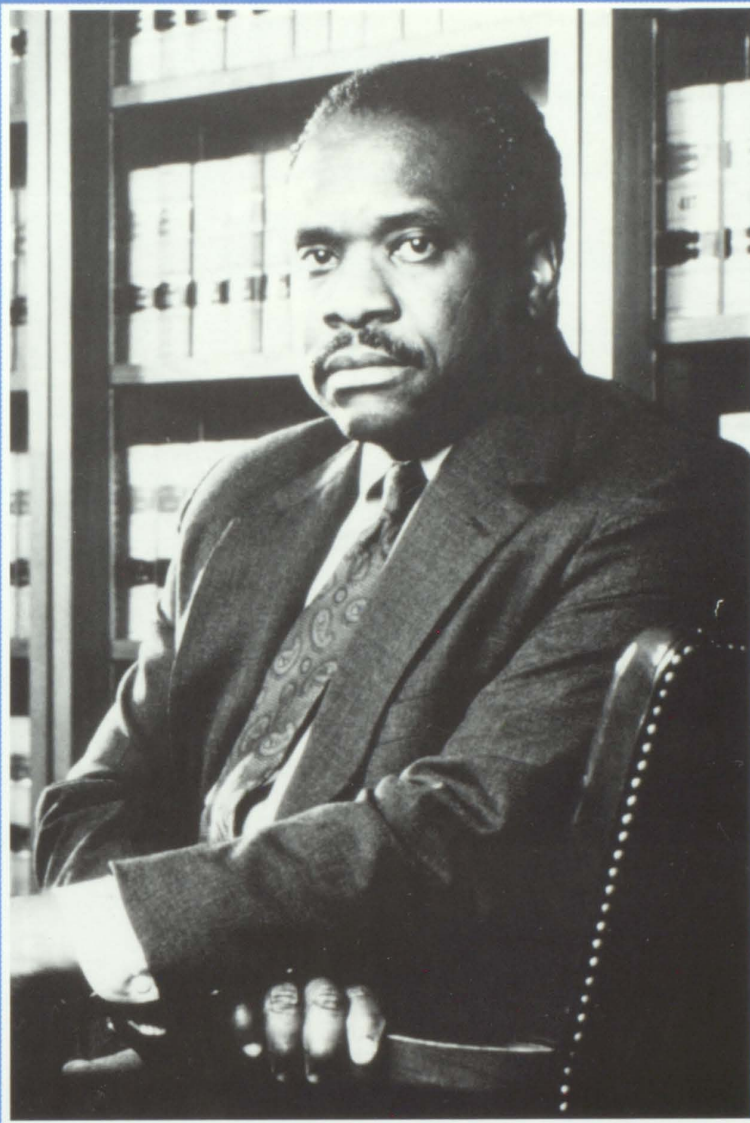
Topics that were also big in the news, included the rape trials of **William Kennedy Smith** and ex-Heavy Weight Champion, **Iron Mike Tyson**.

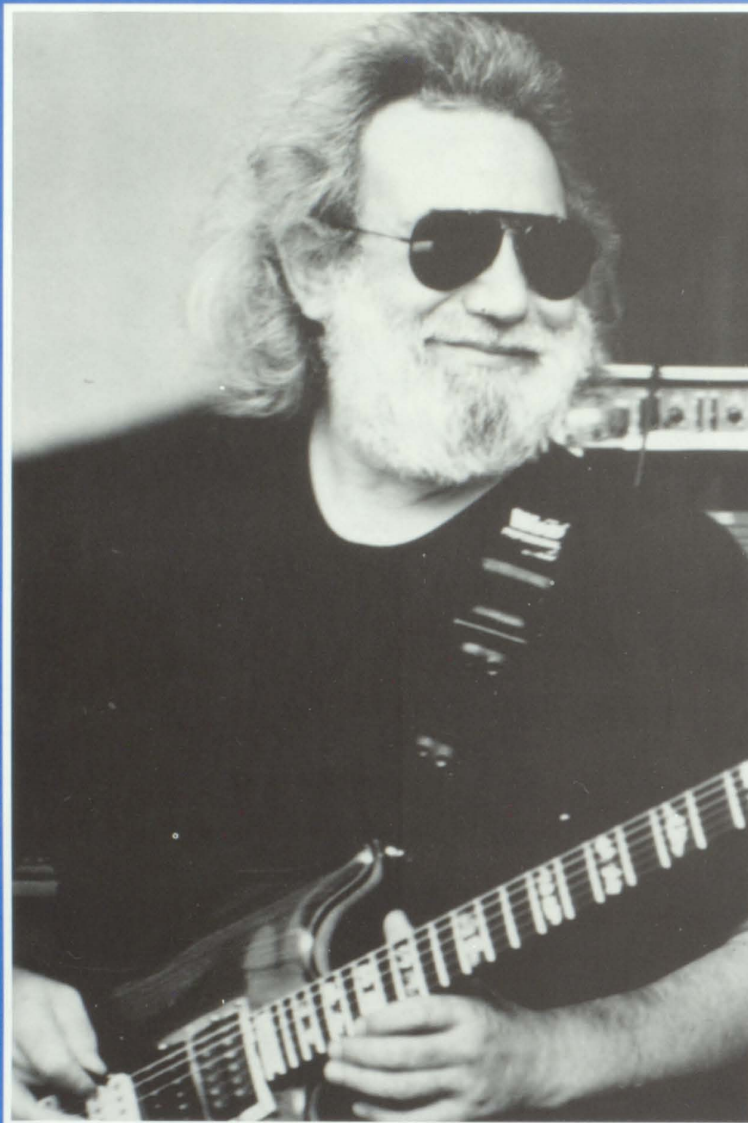

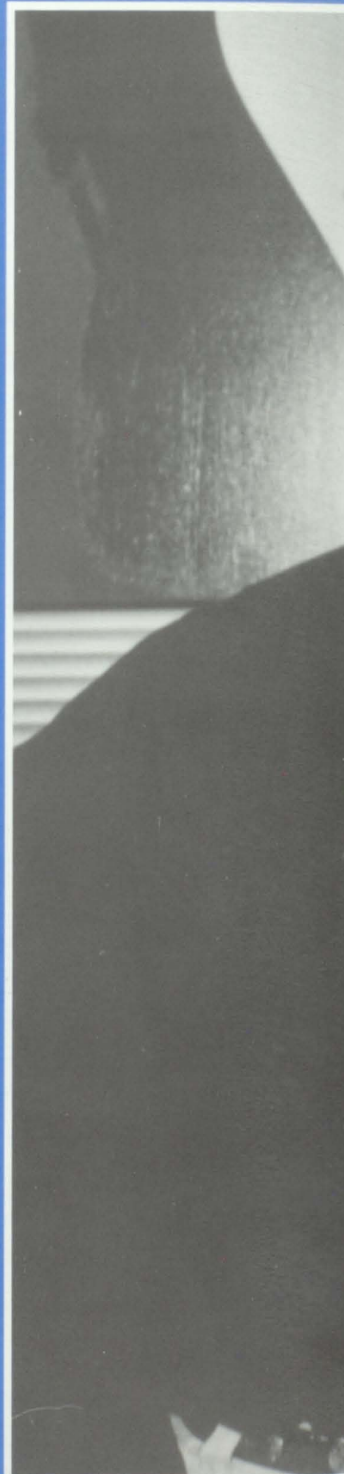

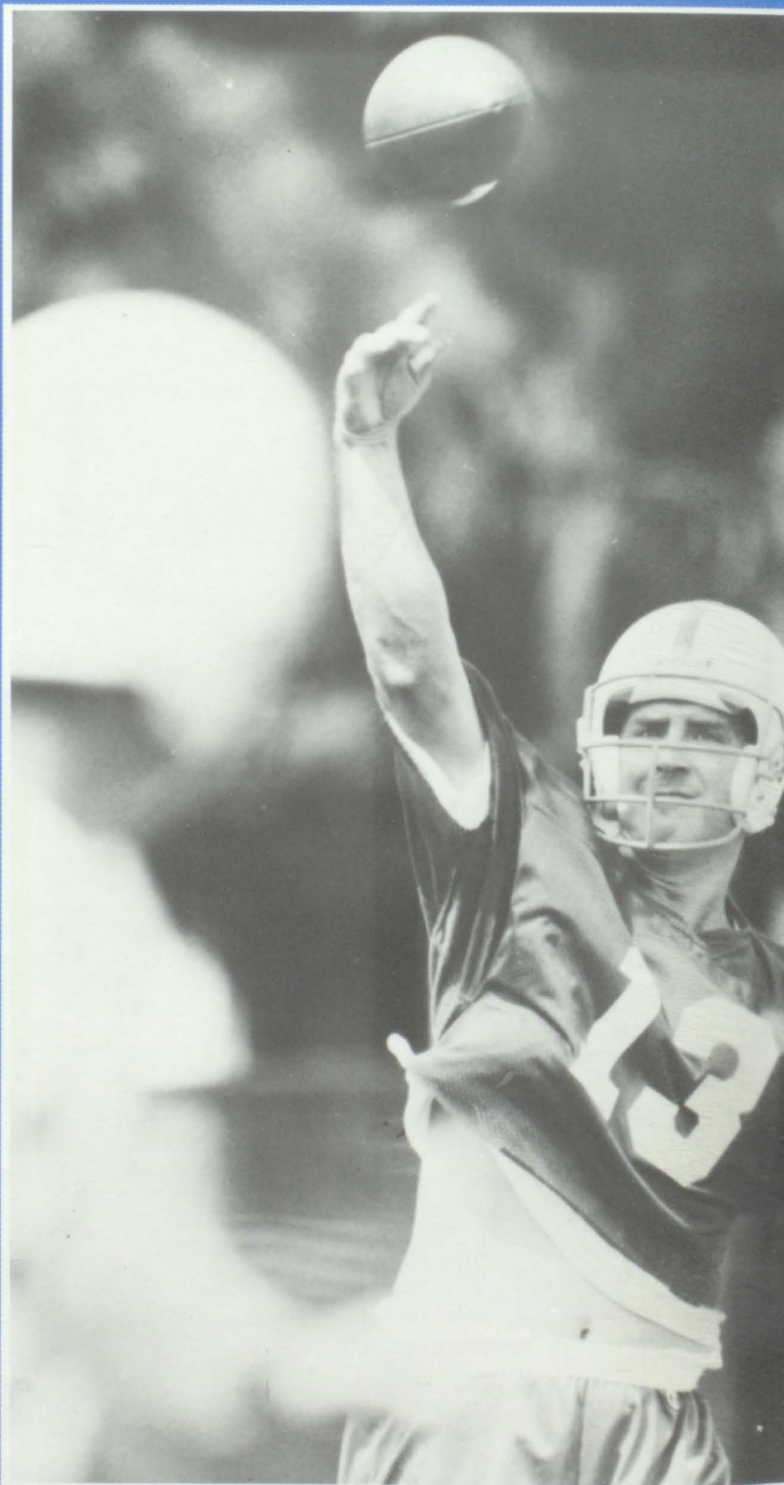
In the regular season the gridiron was close. Every team had a superb season but only the best went on to the Conference Championship games. Other teams that had

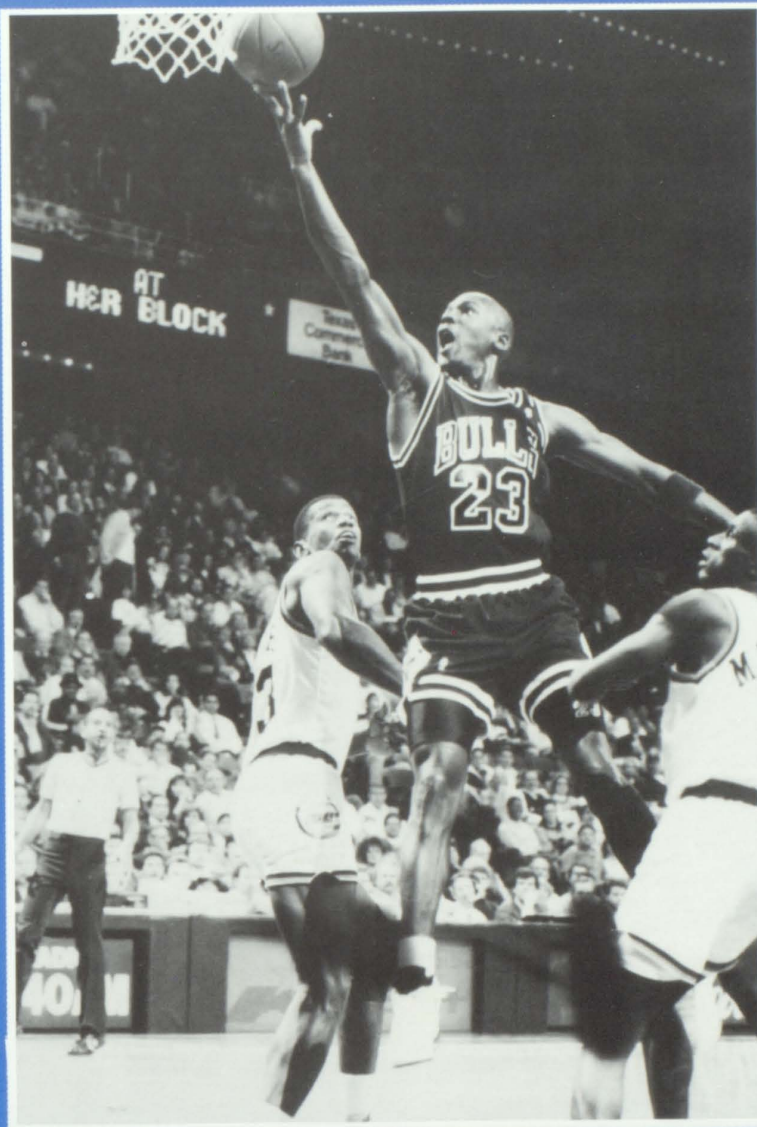

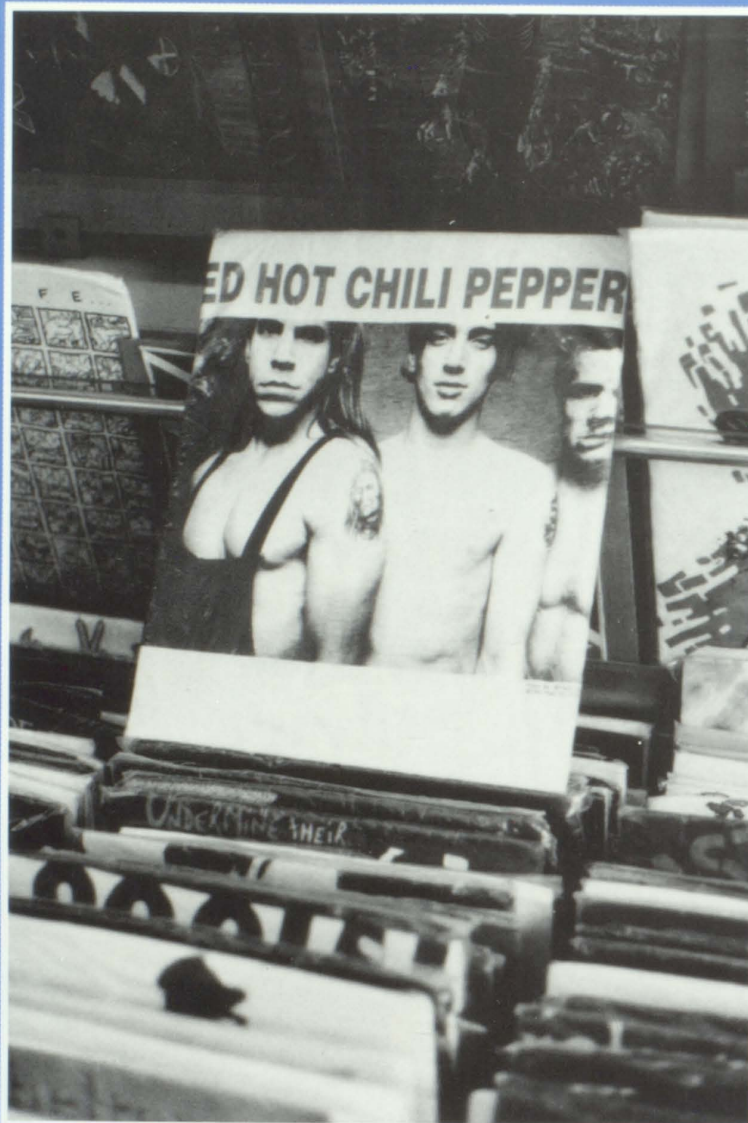

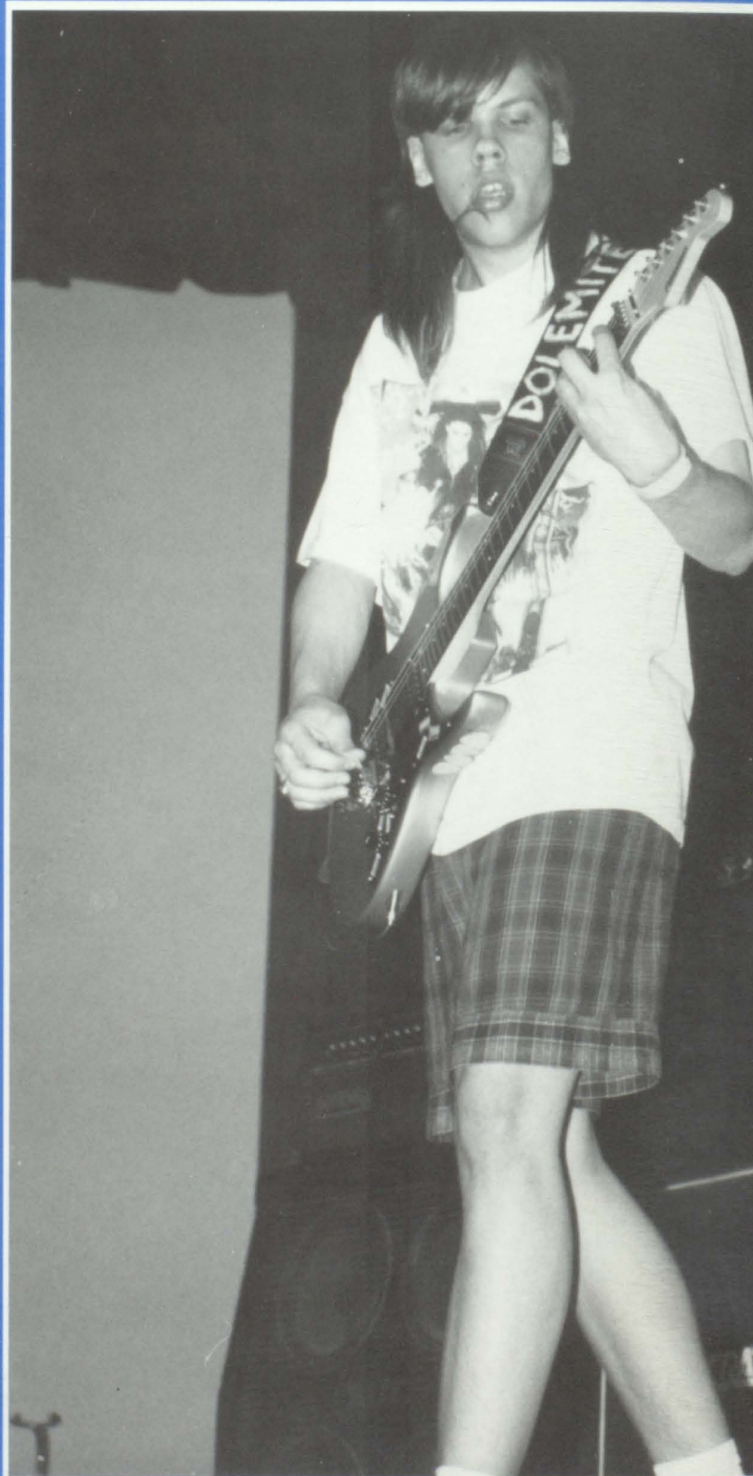
Law', plus a Black Crows tune. Decadence ended their set with a hostile rendition of 'Suprise You're Dead', by Faith No More.
